Australians Meet U.S. Tennis Team To-Day; Alerts Go To Guelph To-Morrow

Tilden Does Not Take Australians Seriously

Figures U. S. Tennis Team Should Defend Davis Cup In Series Which Open To-Day

NEW YORK, August 30 .- The challenge round of the team lawn tennis championship of the world for the Davis cup opens to-morrow at the New Stadium at Forest Hills, Long Island, when J. O. Anderson, of Australia, plays Little Bill Johnston, of America. This will be followed by the meeting of J. B. Hawkes, of Australia, and myself.

Conditions point to great tennis. Th weather, which early in the week looked bad, with rain falling at frequen ed bad, with rain failing at frequence periods, seems settled and clear. The courts, which have been very slow and soft, should be in excellent condition when play is called. The turf is in magnificent condition, the grass fuil and thick, the field well-drained and covered. The American team has not yet been announced, although I expect to see Williams and myself selected for the match. J. O. Anderson has shown and looked to be primed for the big test. Frankly, I expect to see Johnston win, probably in four sets. I believe I should defeat Hawkes, but I realize rame. that he is a very dangerous opponent at all times and that I cannot afford to run

the risk of overconfidence.

Captain Williams has only worked us just hard enough to have us all keen and eager. We are undertennised rather than overtennised, which speaks strong for Williams' leadership. Nothing Is so dangerous as to be a shade stale, and cer-tainly no one can accuse the American team of lack of keenness. Williams himself is playing marvel ous tennis and should prove a big factor in the doubles match.


