**MINERALS IN CANADA**

Mineral production in Canada during 1922 is estimated to be worth \$18,622,000 an increase of practically \$6,000,000 over the production of the previous year, according to a preliminary report of the Bureau of Statistics. The value of the metals produced was \$61,731,000 as compared with \$49,343,232 in the preceding year, fuels and other non-metals dropped \$4,000,000 to a total of \$83,891,000, and the production of structural materials and clay products has been estimated at the same valuation as last year, namely, \$35,000,000.

### MATERNITY BENEFITS

A comparative study of maternal mortality rates in various countries on both sides of the Atlantic resulted in the recent discovery that our Canadian rate of maternal mortality is abnormally high. There were no fewer than eighteen nations whose rates are lower than ours, and in the majority of these cases the rate is very much lower than ours.

"Why is Canada's rate so high?" people have frequently asked. There are many different answers to the question. Some point out the fact that many of our women live in remote districts where it is difficult to secure medical or nursing service. Others lay a great deal of the blame on uneducated midwives who are often ignorant of fundamental laws of hygiene. Still others assert that the mortality rate among mothers would be lowered if more emphasis were to be placed on the study of obstetrics and gynaecology in our medical colleges, and if our nurses in training were to be given longer experience in maternity nursing than is at present the case.

There is considerable force in these and similar statements. But before arriving at any general conclusion on the subject, some study should be given to the methods adopted by those countries where the maternal mortality rate is lower than in Canada.

It is interesting to note that in no fewer than seventeen countries of Europe legislation has been enacted at some time within the last fifty years providing maternity benefits for necessitous women. Another significant fact is this, that in no case has any country of Europe repealed legislation of this sort once it has been enacted, and wherever a change has been made in the original statute it has been for the purpose of extending its scope.

The advantages of schemes for maternity protection and benefit have become so apparent that the International Labor Conference two years ago devoted special attention to the subject and a Draft Convention was adopted for the purpose of guaranteeing protection to all women engaged in commercial and industrial undertakings. In the following year the International Labor Conference recommended that similar protection be given to women engaged in agricultural pursuits as well. What they arrived at as the minimum protection any nation should offer to such women was the following:

- (a) The right of employment for the six weeks following childbirth.
  - (b) The right to leave work on production of a medical certificate stating that confinement will take place within six weeks.
  - (c) The right to benefit sufficient for the full and healthy maintenance of herself and the child during these two periods, such benefit to be provided out of public funds or by a system of insurance.
  - (d) Free attendance by a doctor or certified midwife.
  - (e) The right to period of half an hour twice a day during working hours for the purpose of nursing her child.
- Canada was a party to the Draft Convention for the Protection of Women in Industry, but as yet only one Province, British Columbia, has enacted legislation even partially covering the points given above. It is a matter for speculation as to when the other provincial legislatures will realize the need for conservation of life in some such way as that outlined by the Draft Convention.

### LATE SPRING CHICKS MEAN EGG SCARCITY

Poultry Expert Gives Warning of Low Production Next Winter—Care Needed Now.

"The delayed Spring this year was responsible for many poor hatches and a large proportion of the Spring chicks, this will mean far fewer pullets than usual," says Prof. F. Elford at the Poultry Division of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. A serious situation has thus developed, according to Canada's chief poultry authority. At the present there are practically no eggs in cold storage. Usually eggs are coming forward in heavy shipments at this season and the storage houses become well filled. This year their floors are practically bare and supplies in sight are more limited than they have been for some considerable time.

Canadians are to-day consuming more eggs per capita than ever before, and so, with this combination of circumstances, the late-hatched chicks this year present a serious problem.

It ever there was a need for taking care of the pullets and bringing them to maturity at the earliest date, it is right now. In fact Prof. Elford goes so far as to advise securing expert advice and assistance in order that the maximum of eggs may be secured. Under the circumstances the poultry-keeper and the man or woman who has a few chickens in the backyard should do everything possible to take advantage of these conditions, and secure such information and knowledge as will enable them to get the best results from their hens. He expressed himself as being of the opinion that great good would be accomplished by having reliable information on the care of poultry broadcasted in every possible way. Otherwise, he says, the Canadian people will not be able to eat their egg a day, owing to scarcity and high prices.

### WOMAN OF 97 DIES, LEAVING 178 IN FAMILY

Newport, R. I.—Mrs. Mary Harpoottian, 97 years old, who died at the home of her daughter, is survived by four sons, eight daughters and 178 grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Ten children and 80 grandchildren and great-grandchildren live in this country.

Mrs. Harpoottian was the widow of Stephen Harpoottian, one of the wealthiest men in the town of Kharpoott, Armenia, where she was born in 1825. She came to this country from Constantinople in 1911 and had since lived with her daughter.

at Halifax last week. In thirty-nine of the forty cattle slaughtered tubercular lesions were found in the glands of the head, throat, bronchial, mediastinal, mesenteric, plura, peritoneum. Several of the cattle had small lesions in the lung tissue and one cow was found to have tuberculosis of the udder. The total weight of the cattle slaughtered was six tons.

These herds had been placed under what is known as the "Federal accredited herd system," whereby in the event of loss owners are compensated to the extent of two-thirds of the value of the animal, the government inspector fixing the value.

From present indications a large number of the Maritime shots will be on hand and also it is quite likely that some of the United States visitors at the celebration will enter the events.

### UNITED STATES WILL SEIZE LIQUOR AND SHIPS

Washington.—A new regulation prohibiting the bringing of liquor into United States waters after a certain advance date next month, under penalty of seizure of the liquor carrying ship and arrest of its captain, is understood to have been virtually agreed upon as a result of conferences among officials here.

Foreign Governments are to be notified again of this Government's intention to enforce the Supreme Court's liquor orders vigorously, it is understood, and to warn that the seizure of offending ships will result from further violations.

The plan is to give due notice of the decision so that foreign ship lines can make the necessary changes before the seizure policy becomes effective.


