CURING HAMS.—The following is Miss Leslie's receipt for curing hams. The ingredients for curing is the quantity to be cured in four hours:

Mix together one pound of fine salt, two pounds of good brown sugar, and two ounces of saltpetre powdered fine; then mix together a quarter of an ounce of cloves, a quarter of an ounce of mace, and half an ounce of nutmeg, all powdered.
