the knowledge and practice of the art of medicine, but, we should judge, rather denies them the science. What a pity that so able a man as Doctor Adami is should not have given the homocopathic theory sufficient study to find out that absolutely the only difference between the homocopythic and the regular schools is in the administration of medicine, and that in that particular the homocopythists have a complete monopoly of the "science" part of it.

THE "REGULAR" AND THE "IR-REGULAR."

Readers of the Homoeopathic Record will remember the reference which was made in the October issue to the test case which was submitted to the readers of the Medical World of Philadelphia by Doctor Chapman. The symptoms of the case, a man in the seventh day of a severe attack of pneumonia, were given at leng h and the physicians of both schools were invited to prescribe for him. The name of the disease was not given. There were numerous replies from both schools, and in the October issue of the World these were summarized by Doctor Aylesworth, of Collingwood, Ont., as follows:-

"We will say that 30 homocopaths prescribed phosphorus only, 5 prescribed lycopodium—enuf to show the diversity of men's minds (provided always homocopaths have minds), one classed by you as a regular school man but evidently like myself, a hybrid, also prescribed phosphinus

In addition to these 30 remedies to be used internally, these seven regular school men prescribe externally (31) cold water aponging, (32) alcohol baths, (33) flaxseed and mustard, (34) bleeding freely, (35) blisters, (36) hot bathing of feet, (37) hot bathing of whole body, (38) mustard poulties.

To sum up, 35 homoeopaths and one regular school man prescribe but two remedies; and of the 36 medical men 31 prescribe the same remedy. Seven regular men prescribe 38 remedies."

It doesn't require much intelligence to recognize in these facts the "regular" school to be the Homoeopathic and the others the "irregulars." The editor of the World himself remarks:—

"It shows that we who are "regu'ar" must admit that our homoeopathic brethren are much the more uniform, except in the matter of potency, and many of them claim that if the right drug is chosen, the potency is not important."
