Statement by Senator E.M. Butler  
on the  
Committee on Education and the Arts  
April 12, 1961

Mr. Chairman,  
My delegation will visit at this time to make some observations about the general conditions of the country and to explain to the Committee what my delegation had learned when it held the staff conference contained in Document B. 100. The discussions we have had here so far have concerned my delegation generally. There has been a free and frank exchange of opinion and a very fruitful exchange of ideas. I think we are going to be able to do a great deal of good in the more general context of the financial situation as a whole. My delegation has been very impressed by the discussion since from the beginning of this case on it had hoped there would be an opportunity for the Third Committee to examine a number of general questions relating to the financial stability of the organization. Information for one reason and another, our Committee based the work it has done and we have not had the opportunity which the Committee would have liked to have some of the broader implications of our work. The general situation has been very satisfactory to report on the firm conviction that what we do in this Committee now and at the joint session next week will be of great financial help in order to bring the financial situation of the organization to a point where it will be able to meet its obligations.
