which was arrived at was carried out and that the business was done with care, efficiency and expedition.

(Translation):

He has proven to this house that he understands the rules and that he intends to put them into effect and into practice fairly and equitably.

Finally, sir, I think those who sit with me on this side of the house would wish me to extend in an especial manner our thanks to the house staff, who in these last few days have been hard put, because of the long hours during which we have had to sit in order to fulfil their duties. They have done them well, and to the Hansard reporters and to those who are responsible for the publication of Hansard, which during the sittings has always been on time in the morning, I express our thanks and our gratitude. From all of those who sit in the House of Commons our very best and good wishes for a happy and pleasant recess.

Mr. H. W. Herridge (Kootenay West): Mr. Speaker, with respect to the remarks made by the hon, member for Laurier concerning yourself, the chairman of the committee, the house leader and the staff, I want to say a round amen. Also I trust the period of the recess will be spent by all hon. members of this house to the general advantage of the people of Canada.

To you, sir, the custodian of the conscience of parliament, and to the Deputy Speaker and the chairman of the committees, I extend appreciation and thanks from all of us for the manner in which you have discharged your responsibilities, difficult though they are, to the complete satisfaction of the members of this house.

L. B. Pearson (Leader of the Hon. Opposition): Mr. Speaker, perhaps I am out of order in rising at this time because two have already spoken from this side but may I in a word, as leader of the official opposition convey my best wishes and warm regards to the Prime Minister (Mr. Diefenbaker), his colleagues and hon, members of the house, I express the hope that they will have a happy recess and come back to the next session energetic and even wiser.

I thought I had made my one and only speech of the session this afternoon when I had the pleasure of piloting through the committee the legislation estimates, but I am now inclined to comment on the irregular but very pleasant references that have been made to the conduct of the Speaker.
