Hon. Jean Chrétien (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. Nil. There is no advertising program for the "Hinterland Who's Who" series of leaflets (4 pages, 8¹/₂" x 11") on Canadian wild animals. The Canadian Wildlife Service has produced eight one-minute television clips in English and French and has supplied them to television stations across the country. The clips are telecast as a public service without charge. The cost of producing one clip in French and English is about 1,625 using footage from a stock-shot library.

2. Most stations do not report their showings, but fifteen stations reported showing the clips 1,260 times in the four months April to July. The estimated value of this time provided free as a public service by media, is \$152,698.

6. From April to September 1968, a total of 18,998 requests for information on wildlife (10,480 in French) were answered by the Canadian Wildlife Service and 1,099 came from the United States. Of these inquiries, 4,170 mentioned the television clips and specifically requested leaflets in the "Hinterland Who's Who" series, but few were from the United States.

7. From April to September about \$3,720.

8. Production of the leaflets required a small percentage of the time of one information officer and one editor. The cost of and Welfare provided a total of \$281,609 to

producing the 105,700 leaflets sent out between April and September 1968 was \$3,720, or about 3¢ each.

INCREASED DISABLED PERSONS ALLOWANCES

Question No. 549-Mr. Muir (Cape Breton-The Sydneys):

What consideration has been given by the government to the possibility of increasing allowances for the disabled under the Disabled Persons' Act?

Hon. John C. Munro (Minister of National Health and Welfare): No consideration is being given to increasing allowances under the Disabled Persons Act as provision is made under the Canada Assistance Plan for federal sharing in supplementary payments to persons who require additional aid, or alternatively for the provinces to provide basic assistance for disabled and other persons in need through general assistance measures. No federal ceiling is placed on the amounts of aid granted under either of these alternatives.
