# Supply

## [Translation]

**Mr. Dawson:** Mr. Speaker, on the same point of order, if the hon. member of the government party is willing to share the next 15 minutes so that we may have seven minutes each, I will be very pleased.

Mr. Olivier: Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of order.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** The hon. member for Longueuil (Mr. Olivier) a point of order.

**Mr. Olivier:** Mr. Speaker, the hon. member on the government side has just received a proposal from the hon. member for Louis-Hébert (Mr. Dawson). He knows very well that if he really wants to take the floor he simply has to rise under Standing Order 29 and ask that such or such a member have leave to take the floor. Since he did not do so, Mr. Speaker, I think that the point he raised is out of order and that the hon. member for Louis-Hébert should have the floor to continue his speech.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** On the point raised by the hon. member, I understand his frustration. It is not easy for the Chair to compensate and satisfy everybody. We were just coming to the conclusion of the debate, which we have now reached at 9.45 p.m. It was my decision—and I do not have to explain it—that with 30 seconds left and this being an opposition motion, one opposition member should have the chance to sum up the debate. In any case, the hon. member had the alternative to move that he be heard. He did not do that. The debate is now concluded, and I must put the question. I do not even need to rule on the point of order he has raised.

Motion agreed to, bill read the second time and the House went into committee thereon, Mr. Laniel in the chair.

**Mr. Knowles:** Mr. Chairman, I rise on a point of order. Can we be assured by the government that there is no borrowing authority tucked away in this bill or anything else which should not be there? I cannot find it, but you never know.
