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That this utterly unjustifiable resort to the use of weapons of war in the interception of defenceless civil aircraft contravenes universally held standards of civilized international behaviour and international law governing civil aviation;

That the Soviet Government has provided neither a credible explanation of the circumstances nor any full acknowledgement of responsibility, appears unrepentant and unwilling to co-operate in international efforts to prevent a repetition of this tragedy;

Therefore, this House expresses its profound sympathy to the bereaved families of the victims;

Condemns the unwarranted attack on the destruction of the Korean airliner on the orders of Soviet authorities;

Demands a full and truthful explanation of this brutal act from the Soviet Government;

Demands that the Soviet Government co-operate fully in any impartial investigation under the auspices of the United Nations and of the International Civil aviation Organization to prevent any repetition of such a tragedy;

Demands that the Soviet authorities immediately offer full and generous compensation to the families of all victims including Canadians; and

Directs the Speaker to convey the text of this motion to the Chairman of the Presidium of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Deputy Speaker: The debate has been interrupted in order that the Hon. Member for Oshawa could give notice of a possible motion. The Chair has the problem at this point that there is a motion to adjourn before the House. Could this be

set aside? Is there unanimous consent to withdrawing that motion and then the Hon. Member for Oshawa could put the motion of which he has given notice. Is it agreed?

Some Hon. Members: Agreed.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Is it the pleasure of the House to adopt the motion?

Some Hon. Members: Agreed.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Deans: Mr. Speaker, I am not absolutely positive but I believe we have now dispensed with the motion that we had before us. I think that what my Leader moved, seconded by the two other Parties, eloquently says what the House of Commons and this Party hoped would be the outcome of today's debate.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Is there unanimous agreement that the House do now adjourn?

Some Hon. Members: Agreed.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: The House is now adjourned until tomorrow at 11 o'clock in the morning.

At 10.38 p.m. the House adjourned without question put, pursuant to Standing Order.
