My dear Mr. Martin,

Thank you so much for your very interesting letter.

It is a long way from New Mexico to British Columbia, but I hope you are happily settled there.

Toronto, I believe, would be the better place for archeology. I am asking the Registrar to send you, however, a General Announcement and an Announcement of the courses offered in the Faculty of Arts and Science and also a Scholarships Announcement, and I would suggest that after you have perused them you write to Dr. C. W. Hendel, Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Science, if you still feel that you would like the boy to undertake his preliminary studies here. We, of course, would be delighted to have him, but I must be frank in telling you that here there are no facilities for the study of archeology.
