

HEAVY LOSSES IN FIRE AT BUFFALO

Half-Million Dollars in Waterfront Property Destroyed in Spectacular Blaze.

BUFFALO, May 15 .- (Can. Press.) -Half a million dollars' worth of waterfront property was destroyed by fire today. The Erie elevator, one of the old style wooden structures, with its bins filled with wheat, corn and its bins filled with wheat, corn and other grains, was completely destroyed, the southlend of the Eric Railroad Co.'s eastbound freight sheds was damaged by the flames and a large quantity of flour stored there was ruined by water. The flames leaped across Buffalo Creek and set fire to the Lehigh Valley Railroad Co.'s trestle, but this blaze was quickly checked by a fire tug. Twenty-eight box cars loaded with grain were destroyed.

The fire was a most spectacular one, and for a time a large section of the waterfront terminals was threatened. The wind, blowing at the rate of 25 miles an hour, scattered the blazing embers over the buildings on both miles an hour, scattered the blazing embers over the buildings on both sides of Buffalo Creek, causing frequent small blazes. The fire started in the cupola of the elevator and was caused either by a spank from a passing, tug or spontaneous combustion, according to the elevator officials.

The clevator was owned by the Eric Railroad Co. and was leased to the Buffalo Grain Co. The loss on the building is estimated at \$175,000, and on the grain at \$300,000.
