

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



SOMETHING LIKE AN ORATOR.



Macdonaid, the editor of The Toronto Globe, we are told that Dr. Macdonaid is the most popular speaker on the American continent today, before representative and serious gatherings of importance. "Some-times he passes to and fro on the plat-form, like a lion caged. Again, he doubles up like a jack-knife, or crouches like a leopard about to spring Then he thrusts both hands deep into Now he is victously stabbing the air with his forefinger, driving in his point, or those long arms swing like pendulums. Again, he frenziedly rumples his hair or clutches it by handfuls. There is no predicting what his next gesture will be. He slaps his thigh like a man telling a story to a group of his cronies. I have seen him stand for more than a minute on his left leg, kicking the calf of it with his right toe!"

His Greatest Moment.

The greatest moment and the most golden memories of Dr. Macdonald's life are the times when he took greet-ings from President Taft to the Gen-eral Assemblics of the Scottish Churches. He has repeatedly refused public office in Canada. It is rumor ed that he was offered the successor ship to Laurier. Twice Scotlish Lib erals have offered him a seat in par liament from a constituency which has never been anything else than Liberal This touches his heart, tho it does not tempt him, for the Scotch element in the man is something more than pride. He loves the Highlands as if he had been reared in them. When he discovered a Scotch community in North Carolina he visited it, and then talked about it for months afterwards with every friend he met. Dr. Mac-donald, who was born in 1862, was pastor of Knox Church at St. Thomas, Ontario, from 1891 to 1896. Then he entered religious journalism, becoming editor of The Westminster, He is now in command of the great Liberal organ, of the Dominion. which has grown under him steadily in prestige and power.
