**MILK GIVES DOWN TO EIGHT CENTS**  
Alleged Milk Combine in Hamilton May Soon Be Prosecuted.

**THE Y.W.C.A. CAMPAIGN**  
Twenty-Two Thousand Dollars Already Raised for New Buildings.

HAMILTON, Dec. 1.—It begins to look as if the civic officials will be successful in their fight for cheaper milk. The promise of Mayor Allan and Controller Bird that in a day or two there will be some startling developments in connection with the alleged combine among the milk dealers, City Clerk Kent made the definite announcement this morning that in three days milk will be sold for eight cents a quart, or less.

Controlled Bird announced today that the information he had already would make it pretty hot for some of the milk dealers, and the mayor declared there was no further doubt of a complete victory.

Search is Continued.

**SHIFTING BOARDS FOR LAKE VESSELS**  
Suggestion Offered by Witnesses at the Adjourned Goderich Inquiry.

**BOAT DRILL LACKING**  
Not Enough Inspectors and Insufficient Time to Do Their Work.

(Special to The Toronto World).  
GODERICH, Dec. 1.—Another session of the coroner's inquest in connection with the recent disaster on Lake Huron, was held here this afternoon and a further adjournment was made to Saturday, Dec. 13, when it is hoped a conclusion will be reached. Coroner Hunter presided and Crown Attorney Sager conducted the investigation. There appeared to be no general enquiry as to the conditions affecting lake navigation.

William Allan of the Toronto office of the Dominion meteorological service gave some very interesting testimony. He said the heavy gale signal was up at all ports on the lakes from Nov. 7 to Nov. 19, the forecast out predicted strong winds and snow. Only five times this season, once in July, once in September, twice in October and once on Nov. 7, were the heavy gale signals ordered up on the lakes, and on each occasion they were justified by the weather that followed. It was the practice to make out the weather charts twice each day, at 9:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m., and the forecasts to be given to the fore-casters at all the stations. On Saturday night the forecasts were not out, as the telegraph offices closed early and the forecasts were not sent out on Sunday. Accordingly, when the storm abated on Saturday, Nov. 8 (this storm was felt chiefly on Lake St. Clair), the fore-casters were given a warning of the next storm that came on Sunday. The witness maintained, however, that the heavy gale signal was still up this should have served as a warning. Since the storm the meteorological office has been sending the Saturday night forecast to the wireless station at Midland, whence it could be communicated to vessels having wireless equipment.

An Engineer's Opinion.  
That there were not enough inspectors and that the inspectors did not do their duty, was the opinion of John W. Taylor, for many years an engineer on lake steamers. As a consequence of the disaster, he suggested that lifeboats and lifebelts for the saving of life. Sometimes he had a lifebelt in his room and sometimes he had one in the cabin, when he was on the steamer Fairmount, he was not supplied with a lifebelt. He thought every vessel should have a shifting board.

At an early hour this morning, as a freight train on the Midland division of the G.T.R. was en route to Belleville, six cars laden with grain jumped the track and rolled into a ditch. The accident occurred near Strathroy. The train was blocked for some time. Benjamin Weese and a foreigner named Tapp, were severely injured by a premature blast of dynamite at the Lehigh Cement Works. Weese's right arm was frightfully lacerated and his right leg injured. Tapp, a foreigner's legs were terribly mangled. The victims are in the hospital here. They are married men with families.

**"STRIKE" ON MEDICAL MEN THREATENED IN WELLAND**  
Fraternities Virtually Present Ultimatum Regarding Fees for Lodge Work.  
WELLAND, Dec. 1.—The rate war between local doctors and a number of the lodges, which has been to the front more or less for more than a month, broke out again when a meeting of appointed representatives of the I.O.F., A.O.F. Rechabites and C.O.C.F. was held in the Y.M.C.A. parlors, and a final ultimatum laid down to the medical men of the town.

**DEBATE ON SUFFRAGE WENT WOMEN'S WAY**  
Y. M. C. A. Orators Were Stronger at Argument Than Bond Street Selections.  
Women's suffrage was successfully advocated at a public debate at the Bond Street Congregational Church parlors last night. The affirmative was given by the moot parliament of the Central Y.M.C.A., and the negative side was presented by the Mutual Improvement Society of the church. The speakers were Messrs. Durie and Foster.

**WHEELSMAN MISSING.**  
KINGSTON, Dec. 1.—(Special).—George James of Lanouet, wheelsmen of the steamer Compton, has mysteriously disappeared. He missed the boat at Lancaster on Nov. 20, and took train for Kingston to catch her, but has not been seen since.

**Opening of Parliament.**  
OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—(Special).—Premier Borden stated today at the conclusion of a meeting of the cabinet that the date of the opening of parliament would be decided this week. It is expected that it will be either Jan. 2 or 15.

**FERNOW IS WRONG HEARST DECLARES**  
Dean of Forestry Faculty Criticizes Government Colonial Policy.

Dean Fernow of Toronto University is apparently taking another drive at the colonization policy of the Ontario Government. He demands this time an elaborate soil analysis of the clay belt. His criticisms, however, are not taken seriously in the department of lands, forests and mines, where they are regarded as founded in ignorance of the work now being carried on.

**Exact Reports Obtained.**  
Hon. Mr. Hearst stated that every surveyor sent out afterward was given instructions to prepare exact reports of the soil qualifications he discovered. No district was opened unless it was known that it would produce good crops.

**RESTRICTIONS ON SALE OF GERMAN DIAMONDS**  
BERLIN, Dec. 1.—(Can. Press).—The ministerial council, Dr. von Bismarck-Holweg, has issued an order that the marketing of German diamonds in 1914 shall be restricted to 1,000,000 karats. The production of 1913 was approximately 1,440,000 karats.

**JUMPED THE RAILS.**  
Traveling eastward at a medium rate of speed, a passenger train on the rails at the corner of Coxwell street and Gerrard street, at 6:30 last evening. The passengers were somewhat shaken, but no one was hurt. A freight train, No. 230 east of Gerrard street, was the only one requiring medical attention. She was taken to a nearby drug store to receive first aid for a fractured leg, and was then able to proceed to her home.

**ROUTE FOR RADIALS**  
Resolution Passed Asking Commission to Use Eglinton Avenue Line.

Frank Barber, the township engineer, submitted a report to the York Township Council yesterday regarding the proposed high level bridge across the West Don at Eglinton Avenue. Mr. Barber pointed out while the Bloor street viaduct will connect with Danforth Avenue, there will be no direct route to the north end of the city from the viaduct. A bridge at Eglinton Avenue, he claimed, was necessary for traffic, there being at present a sufficient volume of traffic for the street. The bridge could be made available, however, for radial lines such as the Toronto Eastern and the Hydro Radial from Fort York. The commission should select the northern route.
