Dublin, July 5.—Michael Cleary, living near the town of Clonmel, was convicted to day of manslaughter in having burned his wife, Bridget Cleary, to death last March. The court deferred his sentence. Cleary believed his wife was bewitched, and upon the advice of Dennis Ganey, the "family doctor," and in the presence of her father and a number of other relatives, held her over a fire and atterwards stripped her and poured parafine over the body and set fire to it.
