

NOVEMBER MAGAZINES.

The Catholic World Magazine for November has many excellent features. Young readers will be especially interested in W. J. P. Colton's story "Who is St. Nicholas?" which is answered in a scholarly treatise. "Why We Catholics Sympathize With Armenia" is lucidly explained by the Rev. R. M. Ryan, C.S.B. and a deeply interesting paper on Eshbaum's "The Northern Alchemists" is contributed by John J. O'Shea. This latter article is illustrated by many views and sketches of relics of Mary, Queen of Scots.

Short stories and exceptional interest to the November Century. Bret Harco contributes Spanish-American romance entitled "The Devotion of Enriquez," which has been illustrated by Gilbert Gaul; "The Tragedy of the Comedy," illustrated by Howard Chandler Christy, deals with a romance in the life of two girl friends for the same young man. The latter story is by Chester Bailey Fernald, the author of "The Cat and the Cherub" in the September number, which has attracted widespread attention.

Prof Sloane describes Napoleon's scheme for invading England. He says: The autumn of 1803 and the spring of 1804 had seen a steady development of resources at Boulogne. It was tentatively arranged that a French fleet of ten sail of the line under Latouche-Trévillo should leave Toulon on July 30 as if to reconquer Egypt, and thus tempt Nelson to follow with the hope of repeating his victory. But the French admiral was to turn and appear at Rochefort on the Bay of Biscay, increase his armament by the addition of six first-rate vessels with a number of frigates, and then, a long distance, arrive in the Straits of Dover, if doubling Cape Clare from the west. "Masters of the Channel for six hours, we are masters of the world," wrote the Emperor. This scheme was thwarted by the untimely death of the admiral.

Messenger of the Sacred Heart. The famous miraculous well of St. Winifrede at Holywell in North Wales is described and beautifully illustrated in the November Messenger of the Sacred Heart. The saint was born about the year 620 and was a collateral descendant of the renowned King Arthur. After she had made a vow of perpetual chastity she was caught in marriage by an American prince who pursued her for her beauty, and as she fled from him towards the church, he drew his sword and severed her head from her body. St. Bouno, who was saying Mass in the church, led the altar on hearing of the atrocious crime. He found that the head of the victim had fallen down the hillside, and from the ground where it lay a wonderful spring had gushed forth. The saint took the head into the church and there concluded the Holy Sacrifice. The conclusion of the description of the Madagascarian mission in the same number is very interesting.

A Coming Concert. The concert announced for Thursday, November 14, in Massey Music Hall, will probably be one of the best of this season. In addition to two of the leading artists in their respective lines in America, two prominent Canadian soloists have been secured, namely: Mme. Isidore Klein, dramatic soprano, and Mr. H. M. Field, pianist. The former makes her first appearance since completing her studies in New York last season. While on her vacation last

Christmas she sang twice in Massey Hall with great success. Mr. Field has spent the summer abroad, and is expected to have a new and very interesting repertoire. The two American artists engaged are Mme. Lillian Blauvelt, beyond doubt the most attractive concert singer on the continent, and Dr. Carl E. Dufft, the eminent basso, who made such a great hit at the opening of Massey Hall in June, 1894. He has not been heard here, since but has been in great demand on the other side, and comes to Toronto with fresh honors won at the Worcester, Mass., festival last month, where he sang with Melba and other distinguished artists.
