Concerning the Buffalo hardwocd market, the Noribwestern Lumberman says: There is considerable effert on the pari of hardwood dealers to get in a good stock before the season opens, especially as so many of the best selling woods are not plenty, and there is a general expectation of higher prices before long. Some dealers report that they are selling very little outside of oak, especially since cypress became so dull and elm ran short.
Fine common and the better grades of shelving are in short supply at Albany. The list of stock on hand in that market gives 350,00 feet of dressing, of which only a small proportion is No. I grade. There is about the same quantity of box strips, which are in fair demand, particularly narrow box. Spruce is scarce, es pecially $1 \frac{14}{4} \times 9$ in., the price of which has advanced nearly three dollars per thousand since October last. In shingles, pickets and lath there is litte doing.
