BRITISH NAVY TO BE SUPREME

Must Make It Secure Against Every Danger, Says Asquith — For Defence, Not for Aggression.

LONDON, May 8.—(Thru Reuters Ottawa agency.)—Premier Asquith was the principal guest last night at the dinner of the Central Association of Bankers.

"I have just come," said the premier, "from witnessing a spectacle to which I suppose there has never been a parallel in the history of the world—the great British fleet which is now assembled under the eyes and in the presence of the King at Weymouth. There never has been, I believe, in the same space of water such an aggregation of the implements of destruction, and as I went around the fleet and inspected at close quarters some of these magnificent, if monstrous, achievements of modern science, the thought could not but occur to me whether the time might not some day arrive, perhaps within the lifetime of the younger generation who are sitting at these tables, when this gigantic expenditure would be diverted into more fruitful and more useful channels and the world be saved from the incubus which at present rests upon some of its best aspirations."

"So far as we are concerned and so far as the fleet of Great Britain is concerned, we know it to be and the world knows it to be, the most powerful and aggressive, but of defence, and with the counsel and ever multiplying interests of which we are the trustees and guardians we cannot afford, so long as the world remains in its present temper, to neglect any means for making these interests secure against every danger. The maintenance of supremacy, of our invincible supremacy at sea, is our first and fundamental condition not only of the integrity of the British Empire, but of the life of the British people."

INSURANCE MANAGER DEAD.

WATERLOO, Ont., May 9.—W. H. Riddell, assistant manager of the Mutual Life Assurance Company, died this morning from apoplexy, after a few hours' illness. He was born in Sparta, York County, August 18, 1827, taught school in the counties of Grey and Bruce, and in the '70's was in newspaper work in Toronto, becoming in 1876, John owner and manager of The Toronto Tribune. He joined the staff of the Mutual Life in 1882 as secretary.

NORTH TORONTO, May 8.—(Special)—"It is safe to say that thru the efforts of the town council fully 1190 ornamental trees have been arranged for on the streets of the town, and in addition to this private firms are doing a good deal along the line of improvement," said D. D. Reid, chairman of the parks and recreation committee, to-night. "The response has been very gratifying and cannot fail to exercise a very beneficial effect on the town as a residential district." Touching on the double-tracking of Yonge-street, Mr. Reid said in his opinion it was impossible to say just how wide a scope the conference might take to-morrow, or whether the question of annexation itself might not come up. The fact that Manager Wilson had stated on Tuesday night most positively that the company would be able to handle the output of the double-track from the south limits of the town led him to believe that some scheme had already been prepared by the company. It was possible that the city might ask the town to make off any definite deal in a cherry. Failing any other solution, the chairman of the parks committee falls back on his old stand-by, the tubes. E. A. Gibson, town solicitor, arrived home this morning from a brief holiday spent at the head of Lake Joseph, up in the Muskoka wilds. The trip, though short, was most enjoyable, and a brief respite from the worries and ironies attendant on the railway franchise. The solicitor stated to-night that he had heard nothing new as to town matters, and did not know whether the conference between the city and local representatives would be private in its nature or no. "Although nothing has yet been done toward completing the underground portion of the main sewer on Yonge-street, progress is said to have been made with the main pipe, and it is fully expected that by the middle of the month the sewer will be laid to a short distance east of Bayview, and the finished. This will cost approximately \$20,000, while the other two together will cost probably a third of this amount. "Townpeople are again reminded of the public meeting called by the Ratepayers' Association on Saturday night in the town hall. WILL BE TRIED AT THE ASSIZES. Gibson to Appear in Police Court This Morning on Charge of Murdering Joseph Rosenthal. Charles Gibson will be tried at the present sittings of the assizes. He comes up in police court this morning, the coroner's jury having already found a verdict of murdering Joseph Rosenthal against him. Even if he is not forthwith committed for trial from police court, it is altogether likely that he will be pressed before the Grand Jury now sitting for indictment upon the plain story of EH Dunkelman, as told at the inquest. It is doubtful whether George Tate Blackstock, K.C., crown prosecutor at the assizes, will take the case, for the reason that Gibson presented his case at Mr. Blackstock's, seeking to retain Mr. Blackstock to conduct his defence. The brief was refused after a student had been sent to the jail to hear Gibson's story, but Mr. Blackstock has not yet fully decided whether this will prevent him from conducting the prosecution.
