CANADIAN HORSE LEADS THE PACERS

R. J. Mackenzie's Joe Patchen
II. More Than Doubles His
Nearest Rival in Win-
ning Money.

Light harness horse racing, like many other branches of sport, had one of the greatest seasons recorded in the history of the game. After getting away to a rather poor and unsatisfactory start, for more than three-quarters of the season there was nothing of unusual interest, but before the Grand Circuit terminated at Lexington, 19 new records were made. The most noteworthy of them all was the circuit's closing, when the peerless trotter established a new world's record of 1:58. In covering the mile circuit the Billings gelding clipped three-fourths of a second from the best previous mark, also made by himself.

In addition to this performance Uhlman as the following day, Oct. 9, when teamed with Lewis Forrest as a pole mate, lowered the world's team record of 2:07, made in 1904 by the Monk and Equity. Uhlman was trained and driven on both occasions by Charles (Doc) Tanner, who as the champion harness horse, Uhlman as a yearling had a mark of 2:15, as a two-year-old was timed in 2:07, and as a matured trotter made the world's record.

The intermediate times of the mile in which the Billings gelding took the new world's mark were: First quarter, 35; half mile, 59; three-quarters, 1:28; and mile, 1:58.

Among the money-winning trotters and pacers over the Grand Circuit new figures were also established. The one named the high honors among the trotters and Rod J. Mackenzie's Joe Patchen II. proved himself the greatest money-winning pacer in the history of the sport. The former started 18 times and is credited with eleven victories, finishing second, third and fourth once, and placed twice. Joe Patchen II. started 13 times and won 12 races, finishing second on the other occasion.

Baden, 2:05, during the campaign, was credited with money winnings to the amount of \$38,500, and Joe Patchen II. 2:03, won \$26,550.

Walter Cox of Dover, N.H., heads the list of money-winning drivers and owners with a total of \$54,885. T. F. Murphy of Poughkeepsie, ranks second with \$44,332, and Edward F. Geers third with \$41,730. Fifteen drivers and owners managed to win amounts above \$10,000 during the season.
