At the local board of health meeting yesterday the mayor said: "I posnize that we have here one of the heat health departments on the ne best health departments on the continent and a most excellent medical health officer. I was under the impression that our medical health officer had the power to go into the military camps, but I find his hands are tied and that he has no jurisdiction. My criticism was averaged. tion. Dr. Hastings, in referring to the outbreak, said if the city did not have medical inspection here he would close all schools. He also explained that his trip to the States was to get pointers on how to combat the disease. "We are organizing our forces," he went on, "in the best possible way we can, but there is no person except those educated along the lines of epidemology and sanitation who can make any suggestions," he said. "We are only too glad to entertain any intelligent suggestion that may be made, but we cannot tolerate any interference.

"For heaven's sake," said Dr. Hastings, "let the people keep cool and let all hysterical people that have bobbed up occasionally, get back into their shells.

Influenza is an acute communicable disease and is contracted by coming in contact with the secretions from the nose, throat and mouth of a person who is ill with the disease. For his reason every effort should be made to avoid such contact. This may be done as follows:

1. The person who is taken ill must go to bed promptly. Early going to bed minimizes the danger of the disease. Furthermore he is thus removed from association with healthy persons. He should be provided with his own toilet articles, eating and drinking utensils, which should be sterilized by boiling after use. All discharges from coughing and sneezing should be collected on a piece of gauze and detroyed by burning.

2. The attendant should be extermely careful not to touch his own face or mouth with his hand while handling the patient or intected articles in the sick room, and should cleanse his hands with soap, water and a nail brush, and hold for five minutes in antiseptic solution (1 in 40) carbolic or (1 in 1000) bi-
