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#### COMPROMISING CANADA'S LOY- ALTY.

Enough has come to light during the past week or two to convince us that Canada may soon have Boers of her own to deal with. The spontaneous and enthusiastic desire of the English-speaking people of this country to tender practical aid to the Mother Country in her South African difficulty is being enemies of the British Empire. Furthermore, it is quite evident that the Government is manipulated by this anti-British element. The Hon. J. Israel Tarte has been playing a high-handed role during the past week or ten days. His premeditated and more than British care to put up with, and more than they will tolerate. Mr. Tarte presumes to throttle every outburst of loyalty on the part of the English-speaking people of Canada towards the Mother Country. There is no mistaking the attitude of Mr. Tarte on the South African conflict. Several events have transpired which prove conclusively that Mr. Tarte, the French-Canadian, and the French element in the Government are not only lukewarm but positively hostile to the idea of our sending a contingent of troops to South Africa. Among these events may be mentioned the ridicule that was heaped by La Presse of Montreal on the proposal to send the contingent. Then Sir Charles Tupper was brought up with a sharp turn because he presumed to tender the Government his sympathy with the movement to organize troops for South Africa. Lieut. Col. Hughes is now threatened with prosecution if he persists in his intention of raising a Canadian corps to fight the Boers. Finally, Mr. Tarte's savage attack on Gen. Hutton, in the columns of his paper, La Patrie, is not so much directed against the general as it is designed to disclose Mr. Tarte's opposition to the project. Mr. Tarte's brutal treatment of General Hutton is an insult to the British army. If the Government has any charge to make against the general it should make it in the regular, official way, and not anonymously through the columns of a paper controlled by one of the Ministers. Mr. Tarte acts wisely he will treat Mr. Tarte's threats with the contempt they deserve. Other circumstances might be mentioned to prove that Mr. Tarte has determined that no Canadian troops will be sent to South Africa. He apparently has forced his determination upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier, if indeed the latter does not voluntarily support Mr. Tarte. The effect of this anti-British sentiment on the part of French Canada is evident in the halting policy of the Government. With the exception of the Province of Quebec this country is unanimously in favor of immediate action being taken to despatch troops to South Africa. The only discordant note comes from Quebec, and Mr. Tarte, representing French Canada, presumes to throttle the enthusiastic loyalty of the English-speaking people of the Dominion. Mr. Tarte has gone far enough in his hostility to the manifestations of British loyalty that have lately been made all over the country and by all classes of the community. This is a British country and Mr. Tarte will find that if he persists in opposing the loyal and patriotic sentiments of the people he will be unceremoniously brushed aside. Mr. Tarte has placed himself and the Government in a delicate position. It was only the other day that Mr. Tarte, while in Paris, spoke of France as his country. Mr. Tarte is no doubt a power in the Government, but he occupies a ridiculous position when he attempts to control the patriotism of British subjects. Our advice to the English members of the Government is that they should assert their influence, if they have any, and prevent Mr. Tarte from getting into further trouble. Canadian loyalty to the Mother Country must not be compromised by French influence in the Government.

#### CANADA'S BEST CUSTOMER.

Mr. George Johnson, Dominion Statistician, has prepared an interesting resume of Canadian exports of manufactures for the past 31 years. The article appears in the last number of The Canadian Manufacturer. According to Mr. Johnson we have exported since Confederation, i.e., from June 30, 1867, to June 30, 1898—thirty-one years—of home products, to the value of \$2,464,000,000. These products have been of the farm, the mine, the fisheries, the forest, the workshop and the factory. Our best customer during these thirty-one years has been the Mother Country. She has taken more than one-half of the whole, or \$1,260,585,323. Our second customer has been the United States, which has taken over \$855,000,000, or 35.05 per cent. of the whole. The British West Indies come next with purchases from us amounting to \$50,045,541. Newfoundland has taken \$48,807,302; France, \$12,190,654; Germany, \$9,080,194, and all other countries, \$118,640,647. Great Britain began in 1868 by taking about \$18,000,000 of our products. By 1872 she had got beyond \$25,000,000; by 1882, nearly \$40,000,000; by 1892, beyond \$45,000,000, after which year her takings increased steadily till, in 1898, they were over \$93,000,000. The United States has shown no such activity in buying from us. In 1868 the purchases of that country from us amounted to over \$22,000,000. By 1872 these had increased to nearly \$30,000,000; by 1882, to \$41,700,000. This is the highest figure their purchases ever reached. They have been steadily decreasing, and in 1898 they were only \$34,400,000. During the thirty-one years Great Britain's purchases from us have increased five times more than they were in the first year of Confederation. In the same period the United States purchases have increased about two-thirds more than they were in 1868. Great Britain, which purchased in 1868 four and four-tenths millions of dollars less than the United States, bought in 1898, fifty-eight and three-tenths millions more than the United States.

**ENGLISH CAPITAL AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.**  
The long-expected influx of English capital into British Columbia does not materialize. The Mining Journal, London, is as much surprised as we are at the failure of the boom to materialize. It looks upon the situation as a kind of paradox. It

says: For a considerable time now interest appears to have quite died out in British Columbia mining, and for this apathy we defy anyone to give any adequate reason. The shares of the various British Columbian companies are quite neglected on the market, and are almost as dead as New Zealand. Twelve months ago we were supposed to be on the eve of a British Columbian "boom," but it has failed to come off up to the present, and we do not think any of the self-constituted prophets would care to predict as to when that interesting event will now take place. The country, however, is not by any means neglected by the exploring and finance companies which, when they have met with failure elsewhere—especially in Western Australia—set their eyes yearningly in the direction of British Columbia. In the past of meeting with some mine that shall more than make up for past misfortunes. But, as we have said, apart from this, interest in the colony seems to have died out for the time being, and it certainly cannot be for the reason that the capabilities of the country have failed to come up to anticipations. Its richness has long ago been conclusively proved, and the letters from our correspondent continue to show that the prospects of the mining industry are as promising as ever. Maybe much of the neglect is due to the constant anxiety and uncertainty created by the development of events in the Transvaal; though, looking at it from a reasonable point of view, and keeping out of sight the traditions of the Stock Exchange, it should be all the more reason why other gold fields should benefit.

#### STATE CONTROL OF PUBLIC SER- VICES.

The principle of State control or ownership of public services is becoming popular all over Canada. The latest province to declare in favor of it is British Columbia. At least one of the two political parties of that province, the Conservatives, have accepted the principle, and have included it in their platform. One of the planks of this platform bids the party to adopt the principle of Government ownership of railways in so far as the circumstances of the province will admit in the adoption of the principle that no bonus should be granted to any railway company which does not give the Government of the province the control of rates over the lines housed, together with the option of purchase.

#### AFTER THE STOCK.

**Heavy Demand for Shares in the Equitable Company.**  
At the offices of the Trusts and Guaranty Company late yesterday afternoon it was learned that there had been a very heavy enquiry for shares of the Equitable Mining and Developing Company, which have been offered to the public under the guarantee made by the Trusts and Guaranty Co. of dividends of eight per cent. per annum for five years. Only one hundred and fifty thousand shares in the company, which controls the rich hematite iron mines in the north-west of the province, are all preferred stock. It was stated that the entire amount would probably be doubly subscribed before the books closed on Friday afternoon. The allotment of the stock will probably be made next week. The company has been very successful in the stock market, and arrangements have been made whereby the remaining ninety per cent. of share buyers' subscriptions can be paid in instalments of twenty-five per cent.
