over the awarding of the contract for a generator and engine for the City The Board of Control recommended acceptance of the tender of the Canadian General Electric Company at \$2330, and thus caused a vigorous protest from the United Electric Company, who tendered fully in accordance with the specifications at \$1900. Council sent the matter back to the Board of Control for recommendation, and it came up yesterday afternoon, when, after hearing Mr. Johnson of the United Company, Mr. McBirney of the Canadian Company, and Chief Engineer Bannon, the board stayed by its original recommendation. Mr. Johnson was indignant and he threatened to fight the matter out in Council, and wherever else it might be necessary. It is contention was that he had the best generator, that his tender was \$430 lower than his rival's, and that he had conformed entirely to the specifihad conformed entirely to the specifi-cations under which tenders were in-vited. Therefore, he thought it out-rageous that the contract should go to a firm whose price was so much high-
