Private Companies Should Get No More Because They Have All

HOW TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC

Municipalities Must Be Allowed to Develop as Well as Transmit-Rights of Companies.

A special representative of The Tele gram, writing from Niagara Falls or the power question, says the best sites for power development have already been taken up, and that any new company would find it difficult to locate on with Ruth White and Gus Wein a suitable site without a much heavier expenditure than the existing compan-

es will be put to.

It is pointed out that the amount of power to be developed by the three ompanies is very vast-375,000 horse power. It is hardly possible to grasp what that means. "That amount of power would turn all the machinery in a city fitteen times the size of Toronto; that is, a city of over 3,000,000 inhabitants, allowing 25,000 horse power to tants, allowing 25,000 horse power to Toronto in her present size."

Anticipating a united effort on the part of the municipalities to obtain cheap Niagara power, The Telegram correspondent makes these suggestions: First, and this is of the utmost importance, no further site should be granted to any private company to generate power on the Canadian side from Fort Erie to Queenston. The municipalities should demand that they have palities should demand that they have the refusal of any site, and despite what may be said the sites are not at all many in number. Just where two more sites are to be found in the Park

is very difficult to say.

Another suggestion is that the municipalities should demand the right to develop power. While they might not find it necessary to avail the same and the right to develop power. necessary to avail thems of this right, better terms could be made with the generating companies which may mutually agree upon a

minimum price.

The towns and cities represented should have rights granted to go into the power business wholesale. That is, each city or town should have an absoeach city or town should have an absolute monopoly of the retailing of power within its limits. They could bargain for a block of power at a much better rate than the individual manufacturers, and that is the only way to prevent discrimination, as it is, the power companies across the river charge all kinds of prices, there seems to be no fixed rule and the way is open for much unjust discrimination.

No private power company should be given right to put one single wire within any town or city in Ontario. Any action in this matter should be taken not later than the first meeting of the legislature.

BASTERIA AND VOLCANOES.

Lectures at Open Meeting of Natural Science Association

University held its annual open meeting ast night in the Biological Building, with Dr. F. H. Scott in the chair. "Per Angusta ad Augusta," is a good motto for the society, for the the attendance was, as usual slim, the speakers were men eminently able to deal with their subjects, and the evening was a scientific treat to amateurs. Dr. J. A. Amyot, bacteriologist of the Board of Health, spoke on "Bacteria." He dealt with their structure and methods of reproduction. He spoke of their userulness to plant life in providing nitrogen, and to irdustries in the manufacture of vinegar cheese and butter. They were also the causes of disease, and an outline was given of the work that had been made possible by the knowledge of this fact. Their curative properties, as in inoculation and anti-toxins, were also touched upon.

Prof. A. P. Coleman took "Volcanoes" as his subject, and showed the mode of organic action in their disturbances. He classified the disastrous results of cruptions as due to the outpouring of lava on the explosive effects of steam. The Hawaiian volcanops were taken as examples of the gentle lava flow, and Krakatoa as showing the effects of steam. The life history of two or three volcanoes was given, special aftention being given to Mount Vesuvius. A brief account of Mount Pelee closed the ecture.
