Saturday, Sept. 7.
Today's market was a hummer in every sense of the word. Last Saturday's market was a large one, but there was a much larger crowd of farmers, gardeners, and hucksters present today. There was a good demand in all lines, with the exception of apples and potatoes, the market being over-supplied in these lines. There was not any great change in prices in any particular line.
Grain—Oats were not very plentiful and prices were higher. Old oats sold at \$1.50 to \$1.52 per cwt.; and new oats at \$1.33 to \$1.40, mostly at \$1.35 per cwt. Wheat sold at 85c and 86c per bushel for both old and new.
Hay and Straw—A couple of loads of hay was brought in, which sold at \$14 and \$14.25 per ton. There will be a fair demand for hay on Monday and Tuesday, as there will not be much offered on the remaining days of next week. Straw is selling at \$6 and \$6.50 per ton.
Vegetables and Roots—Potatoes were a drug, as there was to many offered. They have not started to bring in any quantity for the winter, and those produced today were for present requirements. Sales were

resented, mostly home grown, which sold at 85c to 90c for the 11-quart basket, and 55c for the 6-quart basket. Peas were plentiful at \$1 per bushel for small, and \$1.20, and occasionally \$2, for large. Peaches sold at 75c to 1.00 per bushel. Crabapples were scarce at 25c per peck.

Poultry—There was a large supply. Sales were hardly as brisk as last Saturday. Chickens sold at 12c per pound, dressed, or 80c to 90c to 1.00 per pair, old, 7c per pound, alive, or 8c to 9c, dressed. Ducks were dull at 80c to 90c per pair, dressed, and 65c to 80c, alive. Turkeys sold at 13c to 14c per pound, dressed.

Dressed Hogs—Prices were lower at \$8.50 to \$9 per cwt., not many selling at the higher price.
Live Hogs—Prices for Monday's shipment will be \$8.25 per cwt. for hogs 160 to 210 pounds in weight, and \$4.50 per cwt. for fat sows.
Small pigs were dull at \$5.50 to \$7 per pair.
Honey—The demand was good at 11 1/2c to 12c per pound for strained in wholesale lots.

LONDON'S BISHOP REACHES CANADA

Dr. Ingram Reaches Quebec, and Is Welcomed by Many Clergymen.

Quebec, Sept. 6. — Dr. Winnipeg Ingram, Bishop of London, arrived this afternoon via S.S. Victorian at 1 o'clock. The distinguished visitor who is accompanied by a chaplain and Mr. Christopher, a layman, was extended a very hearty welcome to the ancient capital, as he was met by the Lord Bishop of Quebec and an array of clergymen and several prominent citizens. He drove in company with Bishop Dunn direct to the citadel and lunched with her Excellency, Lady Grey at the Governor-General's quarters. A telegram expressing his regret at being unavoidably detained was received from Earl Grey. After luncheon, Dr. Ingram visited some of the points of interest in the city of Quebec, and will dine this evening at Bishop Thorpe's. A special car will convey the bishop and party to St. Anne De Beaupre tomorrow morning, and a stop will be made at Montmorency Falls.

The bishop will be the guest at luncheon Saturday with Mr. and Mrs. W. Molson Macpherson. A public reception Saturday afternoon will be from 3:30 to 8 o'clock at Bishop Thorpe's. During his visit here the Bishop of London will visit Laval University on the invitation of Manager Mathew, C. M. G. He will also visit Wolfshild.

After leaving Canada his lordship will proceed to Washington to take part in the ceremony of laying the corner stone of the great cathedral to be built there, thence he will proceed to Richmond, Va., to attend the General Episcopal convention.

Dr. Ingram is looking exceedingly well, and expressed himself as delighted with his crossing.

RAILWAY WAR AT HAMILTON

Grand Trunk and Street Railway Company Row Over Tracks.

Hamilton, Sept. 6.—The Grand Trunk and Street Railway Companies are at war. Recently the city gave the Grand Trunk permission to lay another track across Barton street at Ferguson avenue, but the street railway company objected. Yesterday the Grand Trunk started the work, putting a large gang on the job in an effort to finish it before the street railway company got wise. The street railway company got wise in a hurry, however, and sent another gang down to stop the operations. In the meantime lawyers got busy, hunted up a judge and secured an injunction. Operations have been suspended until the injunction is fought out at Osgoode Hall.

SPIRITUALIST STUMPED

Unable to Read an Unopened Letter, as She Had Boasted.

New York, Sept. 6.—Mrs. May S. Pepper-Vanderbilt, a leader of the spiritualists, appeared as a witness again today in the lunacy proceedings brought against her husband, Edward W. Vanderbilt, by his daughter, Minerva Vanderbilt. Mrs. Vanderbilt had yesterday testified that she was under the control of the spirit "Brighteyes," an Indian child, and through this control, while in a trance, was able to read unopened letters and learn of secrets unknown to the lay mind.

A large crowd filled the court room to listen to the testimony of Mrs. Pepper today. Mrs. Pepper was challenged by counsel for Miss Vanderbilt to read unopened a sealed letter which he handed her. Counsel for Mr. Vanderbilt testified against the question, but Commissioner Ketcham held that the question was material, for if Mrs. Vanderbilt could read the letter through the aid of the unseen "Brighteyes," it would clear up all the questions in the case. The letter was handed to the witness.

"I cannot read it," said Mrs. Pepper. "I am not under the control of 'Brighteyes.'"

DARING HOLD-UP ON ROCK ISLAND

Masked Robbers Make Parlor Car Passengers Deliver at Revolver's Point.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 6.—The Omaha and Texas Express on the Rock Island was raided this morning, just before daylight, near Murdoch, Neb., by three masked men.

The robbers went through the chair car, robbing every passenger therein, securing their pocket books and purses, covered the train crew with revolvers, and escaped by leaping from the train.

Railroad detectives and sheriff's posse are in pursuit, but the robbers have several hours' start on the officers. The robbers were passengers on the train. Shortly after leaving Murdoch the men arose in their seats their faces covered with masks, and with revolvers in each hand, covered the passengers. Then the leader ordered everybody to keep still and not to resist else they would be shot. Two men went down the aisle with hats in hand, while the third kept the passengers covered. All passengers were ordered to throw pocket books into the hats, and this was done. The conductor appeared in the car with a pistol in his hand but was promptly covered with four guns and forced to drop his revolver.

After getting all the money in the car the robbers jumped from the train, which had stopped. An attempt was made to enter the sleeper section but the door was locked, and the attempt was unsuccessful.

ANOTHER MIGHTY FINE IN SIGHT

Standard Oil and Several Railroads May Be Mulcted Eighteen Millions.

Jamestown, N. Y., Sept. 6.—An investigation, which was begun before the federal grand jury in this city early in July, was concluded today and the jury discharged by Judge Hazel, of the western district of New York. Before adjournment the jury found four indictments, one each against the Standard Oil Company, the New York Central Railroad Company, the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and one against the Erie Railroad Company. The indictment against the railway companies separately contributed eighteen counts each and that against the railways jointly contributed fifty-four counts, all of them charging a violation of the interstate commerce law either in accepting or granting or rebates on oil shipments from Olean, N. Y., to points in Vermont. The law provides a penalty of \$20,000 for each provision violated or each count; therefore, if convictions are made according to the indictments returned the three companies named will be subject to a total fine of \$756,000.

In August the same jury returned similar indictments, embracing other charges, against the same concerns, with a total number of counts sufficient to have justified fines, in case of conviction, of more than eighteen million dollars.

BEWARE THIS BIG FAKE

A Bogus Silverware Company Is Vic-timizing Thousands.

Toronto, Sept. 6. — The officials of the inspection branch of the postal department state that between 5,000 and 6,000 letters from all parts of the country have been held in connection with the fraud which a bogus silver company has been working on the public. The letters all came from Niagara Falls, numbering several hundred, will be allowed to remain in there to give the proper person time to present himself and claim his mail. Nearly all the letters contain money orders for 97 cents, the amount asked for by the promoters of the scheme. The Washington authorities have taken the matter up. The letters will be returned to the senders marked "fraudulent" if they are not claimed within a few days.

LETTER-CARRIERS ELECT

Mr. J. Cushing, of London, Made Ontario Vice-President.

Brantford, Sept. 6. — The Canadian Letter-Carriers' Association elected officers for the ensuing term, as follows: President, R. M. Oullet; Nova Scotia, J. F. Day; Manitoba, J. Boyd; British Columbia, E. Bellhouse; chaplain, J. Barnes, Toronto.

Steps are to be taken to organize branches in centers to which free delivery is being extended. The finances were reported in a satisfactory condition.

The establishment of a sick benefit department was discussed, but action was deferred. The next convention will be held at Montreal two years hence.

Budapest, Sept. 7.—Dr. Hnler, an eminent local physician, asserts that he has secured very beneficial results in cancer cases at the University Hospital through the use of an injection of gelatine.

In forty cases thus treated he was unsuccessful in only three.

SHAMROCK AND HARP

Buffalo Home Week Has an Irish-men's Day.

Buffalo, Sept. 6.—Irish and Fraternal Day was one of the great successes of the "Old Home Week" and anniversary celebration. The shamrock and the harp were prominent features of the decorations of the city. The parade of fraternal organizations tonight was a brilliant spectacle. Main street was brilliantly lighted with myriads of vari-colored electric lights festooned across the line of march from great white pillars.

The marching columns of uniformed men, performing intricate evolutions, troops of cavalry, beautiful floats, and other attractions, brought forth salvos of applause from the thousands of men, women and children, who banked the line of march for miles.

MUTINEERS SENTENCED

Russian Court-martial Punishes Battalion That Killed Commander.

Kiev, Russia, Sept. 6.—A court-martial today sentenced the mutineers of the Twenty-first battalion of Sappers, who June 17 killed the commander of the regiment, began firing volleys at random, and were not subdued until surrounded by five battalions of loyal troops. Two of the prisoners were condemned to death, seven were sentenced to periods of imprisonment in the mines, and eighteen received lighter punishments.

Every physician in the city visited the hospital to view the sight, and they say that medical annals record nothing like it nearer than the famous Siamese twins.

The Heldt babies were born face to face. Between the front ribs and lying near the breast bone there is a double heart. Each child had separate and complete sets of all the other organs of the body. The children weighed seven pounds each.
