It is with the same reluctance that a lot of people jot down, mentally, a most unfavorable estimate of those of whom they are anxious to hold only golden opinion. Even Napoleon, who should

know all about it, had it doped out this way: The greatest ornament of an illustrious life is modesty and humility, which go a great way in the character even of the most exalted princes.

There are methods of permitting the most free enterprise in this country in which men can amass reasonable profits without piling up millions and watering capital. It is the combine and manipulation of prices that cut so deeply into the prices paid for necessities.




