

PARIS SUBWAY SYSTEM MAY BE OPERATED BY GOVERNMENT

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WINNIPEG STRIKERS CONTEMPLATE CALLING OFF STRIKE MANY U. S. MINERS KILLED WHEN CAR OF POWDER EXPLODES

WINNIPEG STRIKE LEADERS SERIOUSLY CONSIDERING MOVE TO END WALKOUT, IS REPORT

Central Strike Committee of Manitoba Capital May Be Brought To Time As a Result of Veterans' Attitude Against Sympathetic Strike in That City.

Winnipeg, June 5.—It was rumored today that the central strike committee was considering the advisability of calling off the sympathetic strike in view of the impending action by war veterans.

It was stated at the board of trade that hundreds of union men were ready to return to work, despite contrary orders from the strike committee, as soon as they were assured "adequate protection."

The strike situation seemed to be completely reversed. Labor leaders, who have publicly and aggressively attempted to combat every federal and provincial and municipal attempt to restore tranquility in Winnipeg, were asking "for protection," it was learned at the city hall.

RETURNED SOLDIERS WILL DEMAND THAT ALIENS BE OUSTED

Winnipeg, June 5.—Mayor Charles F. Gray was informed that a parade of several thousand soldiers intended to march to the trades and labor council this forenoon and demand that all aliens be ousted from the Winnipeg unions.

"I understand the soldiers are so incensed over the high-handed methods of strike leaders and insulting remarks made by James Duncan, the Seattle labor leader, yesterday, that they have threatened to wreck the Labor Temple and 'make an example' of the leaders," said Mayor Gray. "I shall urge the men to remember that law and order must be maintained."

Soldiers who attended the mass meeting where Duncan was referred to as a "bunch of ignoramuses."

The city today took over the distribution of milk, and was arranging to provide for bread distribution, if necessary. It was reported that strike leaders were preparing to renege their offer yesterday, ordering all union handlers of foodstuffs to go on strike. Mayor Gray said that milk stations would be opened at all school buildings and that "adequate protection would be furnished."

WESTERN OFFICES ARE FINDING JOBS FOR SEVERAL THOUSAND

Ottawa, June 5.—Owing to the strike situation in Winnipeg, the reports from the Manitoba employment offices for the week ending May 11 have not yet been received. Seventy-four offices in the remaining eight provinces, however, reported that they had referred 4,672 persons to positions during the week, and had referred 1,425 persons to positions during the week ending May 11. In addition, 346 casual jobs were supplied by the employment offices. Improvement over the previous week when the employment offices in these eight provinces referred 4,325 persons to positions during the week ending May 10 was 347 persons, and 501 casual jobs.

STRIKE COPY MUST GET O. K. OF FOREMEN OF COMPOSING ROOMS

Vancouver, B. C., June 5.—Vancouver was going about its business as usual yesterday, despite the general strike. Newspapers appeared, although members of the typographical union refused to set up or handle any news or editorial matter which seemed to reflect on the motives and methods of organized labor at this time. All matter concerning the strike must be submitted to the foreman of the composing room, the newspapers were informed.

CALGARY PRINTERS REFUSE TO JOIN IN SYMPATHETIC STRIKE

Calgary, Alta., June 5.—The Calgary Typographical Union, including in its membership all newspapers and all printing shops, has cast its vote against joining the sympathetic strike here.

REPLY TO GERMANS' COUNTER-PROPOSALS AT END OF WEEK

Paris, June 5.—It is doubtful if the council of four will be able to send a reply to the German counter-proposals to the peace treaty terms before the end of next week, according to the Paris office of Reuters' Limited.

PADEREWSKI PROTESTS AGAINST CHANGE IN SETTLEMENT TERMS

Paris, June 5.—Ignace Jan Paderewski, the Polish premier, has protested to the peace conference leaders against any change in the terms of the settlement of the Silesian question.

PETROGRAD REPORTS CONCERNING CAPTURE SAID TO BE PREMATURE

Copenhagen, June 5.—Persistent reports that Petrograd has been captured are "very premature," according to a statement from the official Estonian Press Bureau here. A report from Estonian headquarters on Tuesday, however, stated that the Petrograd situation was still in doubt. Nothing is known at Estonian headquarters regarding the reported Petrograd capture. The Petrograd situation, the northern corps of the Estonian army is engaged solely in repelling attacks. Southeast of Riga, Estonian forces continue to advance toward Kreitzburg, according to the report.

PLANS FOOD DEPOTS TO COMBAT LATEST ACTION TAKEN BY WINNIPEG STRIKERS

Mayor Gray Makes Counter-Move Following Strike of Bakers.

MORE PARADES TODAY

Citizens and Officials Fear Clash Between Rival Factions.

Winnipeg, June 5.—Both the anti-strike veterans and those who have endorsed the walkout here planned to hold street parades again today. Conciliatory offers have been transmitted by both sides through the railway brotherhood officials, but neither the metal workers nor employers have replied so far as is known. Plans for presenting as strong a show of force as possible to preserve order were agreed on yesterday at a conference of civic, provincial and military officials, when fears of clashes between rival parades was expressed. Further efforts to hamper the food supply were made by strikers, when engineers for milk depots and bakeries were called out. The mayor countered with plans for opening public food depots.

Normal Further West. Reports from cities further west which have been affected by the general strike movement, indicated that conditions were approaching normal, and no further walkouts of importance have occurred. Delegates from Western Canada were in Calgary today to plan organization of the "one big union," and Victoria dispatches said the strike here was marking time. Calgary printers voted not to join the sympathetic strike. Public service utilities, newspapers and stores were operating as usual in Vancouver.

Thomas H. Ince Offers \$50,000 for Airplane Flight

The Motion Picture Producer "Hangs Up" Three Separate Prizes.

Venice, Cal., June 5.—An offer of \$50,000 as prize money for aviators who will attempt the flight from this city to Australia, was made today by Thomas H. Ince, motion picture producer. The first man to land on Australian soil, \$35,000 will be paid, the announcement said. To the first aviator attempting the flight, who although failing to reach Australia, reaches the Hawaiian Islands, \$10,000 will be paid. In the event of none of those attempting the flight reaches the Hawaiian Islands, \$5,000 will be paid to the one making the best showing.

FRENCH GOVT. MAY AGAIN TAKE OVER SUBWAY SYSTEM

Differences Between Employers and Metal Workers Nearing Settlement.

Paris, June 5.—In competent circles optimism prevailed this morning relative to the strike in this city, and hopes were expressed that the trouble between the unions and the employers would soon be settled. Through the efforts of the government the employers and men in the metal industries have come to an understanding on some questions at issue, but there is no change in the situation regarding the transportation strike, and there is again talk of a general strike in the metal industry.

The managing committee of the general labor federation will meet tonight to consider the situation created by the present movement, in which, it should be remarked, the federation had no hand.

HEAVY GOLD SHIPMENTS. New York, June 5.—An additional shipment of \$5,500,000 in gold for the account of the British Government arrived here from Canada today, according to J. P. Morgan & Co. A total of \$12,000,000 in gold has arrived so far, and it is understood that the final sum will aggregate \$20,000,000.

168,275 SOLDIERS AND NURSES SAILED FOR CANADA SINCE TRUCE

London, June 5.—The Prince of Wales dines next week at the Canadian Officers' Club in Chesterfield Gardens. There is a Canadian movement afoot here for a gathering shortly in honor of Gen. Turner. Sir George Perley sails early in July for Canada. Paragraphs have been appearing in the press here recently suggesting that Mr. Huntley Drummond may succeed him.

A summary of May sailings shows that 1,866 officers, 231 nurses, 12 cadets and 41,117 other ranks have sailed for Canada. Since the armistice approximately 8,000 officers and nurses and 160,275 other ranks have sailed.

PRINCE OF WALES ADVISES THAT FLEET BE USED TO RETURN COLONIAL TROOPS

Agent General Wade Attributes Unrest Among Canadian Troops To Delay in Repatriation Caused by Lack of Transport.

London, June 5.—Agent General Wade of British Columbia, in a letter to the press, attributes unrest among Canadian troops here entirely to delay in repatriation, and protests against the military men of the dominions still fretting here in idleness and expense, and daily falling a prey to surroundings, from which they should be provided immediate escape to countries which have represented with so much honor to themselves and their native land.

The Prince of Wales has led the way in constructive imperialism by denouncing the order for further detention from home and other punishments for infractions of regulations, as brutality itself and a wrong to the country. His remedy for shipping shortage is employment of the fleet as transports as the United States has already satisfactorily done. Could anything be more majestic and imperial, he asks, than to return the troops in this way? Will the admiralty forget its promises and allow the grand fleet to drag at anchor when so much can be done?

Search For Capt. Mansell James Is Being Continued

Two More Members of U. S. Air Force Join in Hunt For Canadian Ace.

Waterbury, Conn., June 5.—A. Parsons, former lieutenant in the United States Air Force and Capt. Widex, a former member of the Royal Flying Corps, will leave here today in a Curtiss airplane to search in the vicinity of Plymouth and Bristol, for Capt. Mansell H. James, Canadian ace, who has been missing since Thursday.

Parsons, who was formerly an instructor at the aviation camp is familiar with Plymouth and vicinity, which affords few landing places due to dense woodlands. He believes Capt. James met with an accident when trying to land. Capt. Murdoch of Fortification, with the Southern New England Telephone Company, said tonight he has received definite information from subscribers about James' flight which may lead to his whereabouts.

Soldiers Requested To Contribute To Official History

Those Who Have Served Overseas Can Help in Compiling Government Document.

Ottawa, June 5.—The official history of Canada's great part in the war is already under way. The director of the historical section of the general staff of the Militia Department, Ottawa, has requested that officers and other ranks having in their possession private diaries, journals, note books, letters and other documents relating to personal experiences while on active service during the war will forward them on loan to him for examination. As soon as transcripts or necessary extracts can be made they will be returned to the owners. The contents will be treated as strictly confidential, except when special permission is obtained for publication.

PRIVATE J. SCHMIDT IS BEING TRIED ON SERIOUS CHARGES

Court-Martial in the Kimmel Riots Is Resumed.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Prisoner's Counsel Will Endeavor To Prove An Alibi.

Liverpool, June 5.—The court-martial in the Kimmel riots was resumed today. Private Joseph Schmidt pleaded not guilty to four charges, namely, attacking a body of cavalry, attempting a raid on camp 4 and 20, using violence to a superior officer by firing a rifle shot at Lieut. Gauthier, who was endeavoring to suppress the riot, and alternatively with offering violence to a superior officer by pointing a loaded rifle at Lieut. Gauthier. Major Weyman, defending the accused, contended that the offence should be tried by a civil judge and jury, arguing that the present court could not give an absolutely fair and open-minded trial. The objection was disallowed.

Major George testified that the stoned a body of cavalry at headquarters. Lieut. Clark identified accused as one of ten men who broke into the canteen. Lieut. Gauthier identified accused as prisoner as one of the rioters who attacked camp 20, walking immediately behind the flag bearers. The rioters were twice dispersed. Witness followed them across the field to the huts, between which they retired. When he saw accused and a number of other men they called out: "All right, come along. We see you. We shall soon see you up." Witness said that his party then returned. The rioters commenced firing rifles with ball ammunition. The unit took cover behind a tree, the accused leading. Two other men, all in khaki, came from behind a barn. The accused pointed a rifle at witness and fired. Then two of the men commenced firing at him from one side of a tree, and the third from the other side. Witness had to retreat to camp 20. After the firing ceased witness saw two men lying shot through the head behind the tree.

Serj. Major MacLaren, corroborating the foregoing testimony, said that when the accused pointed a rifle at Lieut. Gauthier he (Schmidt) cried: "Get that man and you have got the lot!" Major Weyman said that witnesses would be called to testify that at the time of the riots the accused was a patient in the camp hospital and wore blue hospital clothes till after dinner, when he changed into khaki and went in the direction of camp 20, where he had an appointment with a girl. He reached the huts when the shooting started and took cover in the trenches. There was only one other man in the trenches. They had no rifles and no shots were fired. Miss O'Neill deposed to meeting Schmidt on previous days. She said she had an appointment with him for the day of the riots. At this point the court adjourned.

SEVENTY-EIGHT MINERS ARE BLOWN TO PIECES OR BODIES CHARRED BEYOND RECOGNITION WHEN POWDER CAR EXPLODES

Sparks From Broken Trolley Wire Running Into Wilkes-Barre Mine Ignited Car of Black Powder Attached To Train Carrying Miners To Work—Women and Children Shrieking and Crying, Endeavor To Find Trace of Relatives Among Dead.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., June 5.—Seventy-eight mine workers were killed and 40 injured at the Baltimore No. 2 tunnel of the Delaware and Hudson Company near here early today. A car of black powder attached to a train of cars on which the men were riding to their chambers in the mine exploded. An electric motor drew the cars. The trolley wire broke and sparks ignited the powder. Men were blown everywhere, but most of the deaths were caused by fire and suffocation.

The accident occurred shortly before 1 o'clock. A train of empty cars was sent to the mouth of the tunnel to take the men into the chambers. One hundred men piled into the cars, which were drawn by an electric motor. At the end of the train was a car of black powder.

PUBLIC UTILITIES MUST GET CONSENT OF MUNICIPALITIES TO USE STREETS

Mowat Amendment To Consolidated Railway Bill Carries by Close Vote.

MINISTERS OPPOSE IT Motion To Bring Employees of Railway Commission Under Civil Service Body Carries

Ottawa, June 5.—At an early hour this morning, the House of Commons gave its aid to municipal ownership, and championed municipal rights by carrying the Mowat amendment to the consolidated railway bill by the close vote of 57 to 52. The effect of this amendment is to place the Toronto and Niagara Power Company, along with all other public utilities companies under the general supervision of the Board of Public Utilities. This also carries the necessity of obtaining municipal consent for the use of streets. Also in acquiring the assets of any public utility company, the Toronto and Niagara Power Company must have to accept all the obligations toward the municipality which the company so acquired was bound to.

All the cabinet ministers in the House at the time voted against the amendment. They were: Hon. N. W. Rowell, Hon. Dr. Reid, Hon. A. L. Sifton, Hon. F. B. Carroll, Hon. S. C. Mewburn and Hon. C. C. Ballantyne. Mr. Mowat (Toronto) then moved another amendment that any company purchasing the Toronto Electric Light Company be bound by the same provisions. This also carried by the same vote.

A motion by Hon. Dr. Reid to bring the employees of the railway commission under the civil service commission, was carried by a majority of 57 to 52. The bill was then reported, and now stands for third reading.

LIMITATIONS OF ARMAMENTS CLAUSE TO BE ELIMINATED

Small Powers Secure Concession From Council of Four.

Paris, June 5.—The small powers have won a victory in their opposition to the limitation of armaments of the new states created from the former Austro-Hungarian empire, as incorporated in the Austrian peace treaty. The council of four has decided to eliminate the provisions for such limitation.

GENERAL CURRIE IS FURTHER HONORED

Invested Along With Two Australian Military Commanders.

London, June 5.—At a public investiture, three generals of the dominion forces received the insignia of Knight of the Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George, namely General Currie of Canada, Birdwood and Monash of Australia.

Decorations for services in North Russia have been awarded as follows: Bar to Distinguished Service Order—Major F. E. Arnold, artillery. Distinguished Service Order—Major L. H. MacKenzie, Nova Scotia Regiment; Capt. A. Eastman, Machine Gun Corps.

TELEGRAPH OPERATOR WHO JOIN SYMPATHETIC STRIKE ARE "FIF"

President of Western Union. They Will Stay Out.

Atlanta, Ga., June 5.—Employees of the Western Union Telegraph Company who went on strike here yesterday in support of telephone operators, who walked out Monday, were informed by the company that none of them will be reinstated, "even if it is necessary to entirely abandon telegraph service at Atlanta." Notices to this effect were posted by order of the president of the company.
