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end of the year, Mayor Little said today. At present there is no connection between these two thoroughfares from Egerton street to Highbury avenue. Hundreds of employees of Dundas street factories who live southeast of the Hamilton road have to make a long detour to reach their work. Ald. F. E. Watkinson has been working on a plan to remedy this, and he, too, is confident that it will be undertaken before next January. As a result of a conference which he arranged with manufacturers and members of the city council, Mayor Little has had plans prepared, and the assessment department has been in communication with the Grand Trunk to learn whether they will sell or lease property for the purpose of the bridge.

There are 22 railroad tracks at this point, making the project a complicated one. A bridge 450 feet long will be required to cross them. It would be built in four spans of 111 feet each, according to City Engineer Brazier, would cost \$35,000. Ald. Watkinson points out that an expenditure of \$25,000 can be authorized by the council without delay as a vote is not required on sums of this kind. He is confident that the remainder of the funds from other sources will be available to complete the actual cost of the bridge, there would be the expense of opening the street and securing a right-of-way.

PEOPLE COULD SOLVE THE POWER SHORTAGE

Voluntary Conservation Only
Hope, Says E. V.
Buchanan.

"By voluntary conservation the people could solve the power shortage themselves," E. V. Buchanan, general manager for the public utilities commission, asserted today.

"Three thousand horsepower is used on the domestic circuits, and I think conceive how it is done, and I think burning unnecessary and electric appliances in use which are not actually needed to create as heavy a load as this. About two hundred horsepower are used in the city, while another four hundred is sufficient for the stores, homes, and other places. The amount consumed by heaters, lights and appliances. If more care was exercised in the use of these it might be possible to bring about the 25 per cent reduction required of the city without shutting off any of the lights."

"The small consumers are not the only ones who could help in this way," he continued. "The manufacturers and other large users should do their share, too."
