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Preliminary Contests Show Skill On First Night of City Tournament

Barrier, Shute, Palmer, McKay, Christie and Judge Are Among the Winners—Keegan of Chicago Wins by Default.

The preliminary bouts of the sixteenth city amateur boxing tournament were held at Mutual-street rink on Saturday night. The big building was filled with enthusiastic spectators, who enjoyed an excellent evening's sport, the last bout ending a few minutes before midnight. The bouts were of better order than preliminaries. Alf Palmer defeated Q. Jones, the latter being expected to go into the final in his class. J. C. Shute of Middlesex won his bout in the heavy-weight class easily. W. Hughes of St. Andrew's, Ont., and E. Faye of St. Andrew's, Ont., put up a good bout, which went four rounds, as the judges were unable to give a decision in three. Hughes won when Billy Mara of the O.A.C. entered the ring for his bout with E. McKay. He succeeded in winning by a narrow margin, McKay putting up a splendid battle. The referee had to stop the next bout—Steele (Don R.C.) v. A. McKay (E.U.A.C.)—in the first round, as Steele was badly beaten. OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Ottawa doubled the score on Argonauts today in the Senior Interprovincial, winning by 20 to 10. Two very costly muffs by Argos kept Ottawa in the lead, and the Argos were led at half-time, 7 to 5, and looked to be winners, but were outplayed in the last half.

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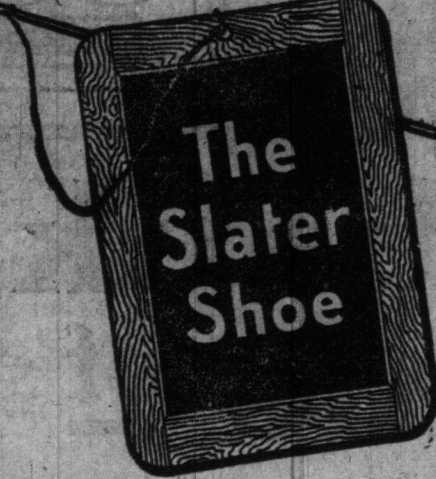
