No doubt a good many people buy automobiles who cannot safely afford to do so. A few, perhaps, as the horrified bankers say. have mortgaged their homes to pay for them. Others have failed to take into account the cost of upkeep. Grant all that! . They will learn, won't they? And if their experience proves to be

often as they induce the squandering of it. Probably three-fifths or more are cared for and operated by their owners, who buy cheap gazoline in-stead of dear oats.
