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WANTS WOMEN NAMED TO ELECTION OFFICES

Prime Minister Requests Appointment to be Persons Enjoying Public Respect.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—W. F. O'Connor, general returning officer, has despatched the following telegram to all returning officers in the Dominion:

"The prime minister has directed me to communicate to you the government's earnest desire that in appointing enumerators, deputy returning officers and poll clerks, persons commanding the confidence of the community should be selected, that just representation be given to all political parties, including labor, and that persons should be recognized by appointment to such positions as being acceptable to them and unlikely to subject them to unpleasantness."

PRESENTS I.O.D.E. CLASSES

Mrs. Gooderham Gives Decorations to Forty-two Members.

At the monthly meeting of the St. George's Chapter, I.O.D.E., held in St. Simon's Parish House, the regent, Miss Kathleen O'Brien, presided, and 42 classes and fibbons attached to the I.O.D.E. pin were presented to the wives and mothers of soldiers who are serving overseas. Eight other members were presented with these classes in England. Mrs. A. E. Gooderham, president of the National Chapter, and a member of St. George's Chapter, made the presentations. Reports presented at the meeting showed that 304 Christmas stockings had been sent overseas, also that 565 stretcher caps had been made. The amount given by the chapter to the British Red Cross was \$1140.50, total receipts \$1357.

WILL TAKE VICTORY LOAN

The Women's Confederation Memorial Fund officials, of which Miss Church is the convener, have decided to invest the sum received to date, which is approximately \$21,000, 60c, a member with \$500 from Tributes Night, in the Victory Loan. The names of subscribers will be recorded and preserved at headquarters. It has also been decided to make a further effort to raise the fund to \$50,000 to ensure permanent headquarters with the close of the war.

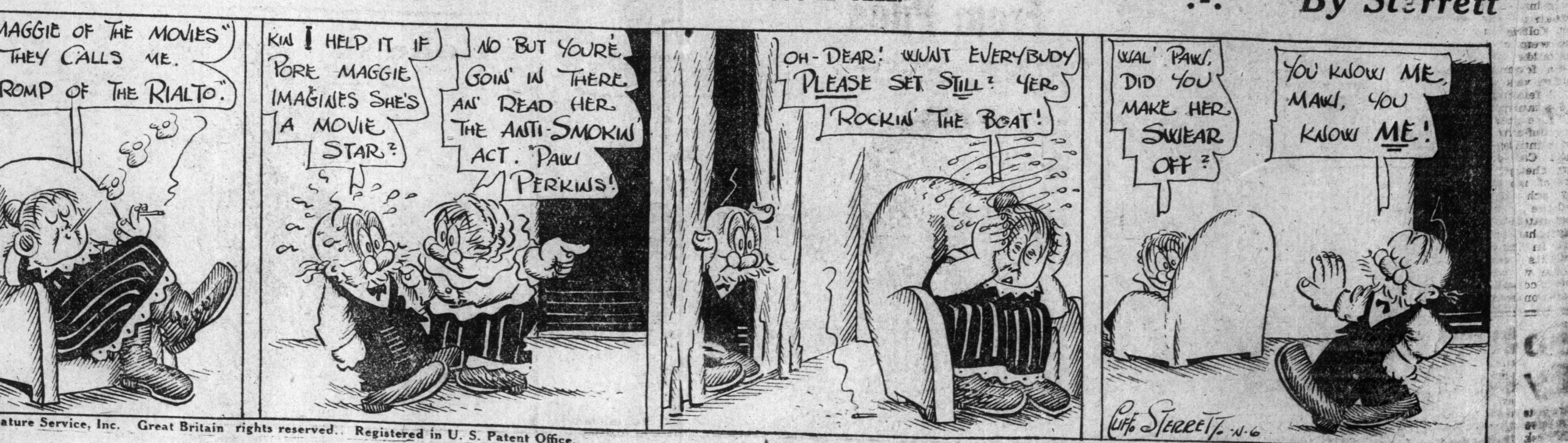
