MILITIA TO TAKE A HAND.

Jacksonville, Fla., Sept. 16.—After two days of quiet in the country near Baxter, an attack was made late last night on a posse which was guarding the home of William Baxter, one of the participants in the alleged Duncan-Alman feud.

One of the members, Ellis Dowling, was killed and several were wounded. Deputy Sheriff Thrift, in charge of the posse, was wounded. A company of state militia has departed for Baxter.

RUSSIA RE CONTRABAND.

How Foodstuffs and Fuel Are to Be Viewed.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 16.—Russia has given her answer to the American ultimatum notes on the subject of contraband of war. Her answer was communicated to British Ambassador Hardinge, this afternoon, verbally by Foreign Minister Lamdorff, and bears out the predictions on the subject of the Associated Press. The ambassador was informed in effect that, according to the decision of the commission, which investigated the subject, the government has agreed to view as of a conditionally contraband character, foodstuffs and fuel, and that supplementary instructions had been issued to the Russian naval commanders and prize courts, calling their attention to the misinterpretation which had been placed upon the prize regulations.

These instructions, Sir Charles Hardinge was informed, make a clear distinction between the articles enumerated in article 4 of the Russian prize regulations which are susceptible of dual use, like fuel and foodstuffs, and articles which are purely contraband. In effect, the new instructions will place the burden of proof that the foodstuffs, etc., are contraband on the Russian side.

The new instructions will involve a reversal of the judgment of the Vladivostok prize court by the admiralty court in the case of the provisions contraband.

A direct answer to the American note is expected to-morrow.
