Four of Them Persuade 1900 Men to Go Out in Chicago Against the Authority and Wish of the Unions---A Suspected Bomb Thrower

CHICAGO, May 6.---Suspected of having thrown a bomb under a United States express wagon, Julius Hilbrecht, is under arrest charged with deadly assault. He is also accused of violating injunctions of the United States circuit court. The alleged bomb throwing took place last night at Des Plaines and Van Buren streets.
