WHEAT JUMPS AGAIN

MONTREAL STRIKERS WILL NOT COME TO A SETTLEMENT

Montreal, May 16.—Acting under strong popular pressure and being conscious of their responsibility in having any share of keeping the harbor tied up any longer, the shipping men late today agreed to make an offer to the striking longshoremen of an advance of 2 1/2 cents an hour. Their letter conveying that information was signed by Hugh A. Allan, president of the Shipping Federation of Canada, and D. McNicoll, vice-president of the C. P. R., and reads as follows:


