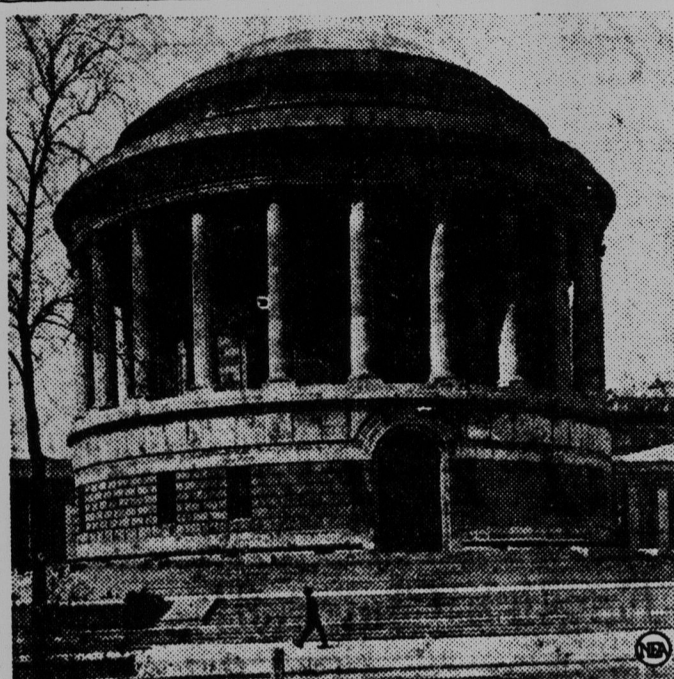

ARGUE JULY 12 OVER SECOND CHAMBER

Nova Scotia Court Sets Date For Legislative Council Hearing

HALIFAX, May 20—July 12 was the date designated today by the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, sitting en banc, for the hearing of the appeal involving in the government's reference respecting the tenure of office of members of the Legislative Council, Nova Scotia's second chamber. The application was made by F. F. Mather, K. C., Deputy Attorney General, today from Florida. Go Deep In Borings On Train Shed Site

Under direction of Supt. Parks a crew of workmen are continuing their soundings on the C. N. R. depot area, Mill street, as the initial step in erecting the new train shed. Borings have been made at the northern side of the tracks toward Paradise Row and opposite the depot—what might be considered as the shore of the old-time water inlet upon which reclamation of the railway facilities now stand. A depth of thirty feet was reached by the drill before the rocky ledge was touched. The drill is today set up between tracks on the new depot premises. It is expected that the borings will be here and still deeper as the soundings are taken towards Pond street.

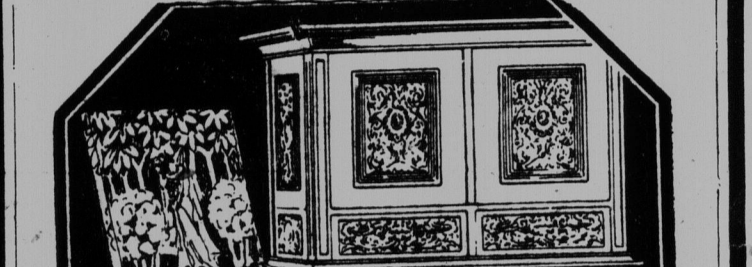
