

KENNEDY TO QUIT SEAT IN COMMONS

Will Resign Over Peace River Dispute; Clashes With Meighen

OTTAWA, June 18.—D. M. Kennedy (Progressive, Peace River) made a statement in the House of Commons today on the question of privilege. He denied a rumor that he was to be given "The Children's Hundred" in order that his seat might be rendered vacant and he announced his intention of resigning from the House of Commons when he could legally do so and the legal proceedings were disposed of. Mr. Kennedy clashed with Mr. Meighen, to whose statement during the recent debate on the Peace River petition he took exception. Mr. Meighen had said that it was rumored that Mr. Kennedy "will get the Children's Hundred" and after he has done his fair share to keep this government in power he will get some nominal job in order that his seat may be vacated. "I deny absolutely the truth of any rumor on which this statement is made. I consider it an insult," Mr. Kennedy went on. His object at present was to disprove the charges made against him personally in the petition of J. A. Collins, which the House of Commons had refused to receive.

ANOTHER ELECTION NEARING IN FRANCE

Each Political Development Brings Dissolution of House Closer

PARIS, June 19.—Each new political development in France is bringing nearer a dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies and a call for new elections. Leading statesmen believe, following announcement of former Premier Herriot's acceptance of the task of cabinet forming adds strength to this prediction. Even if the former government head succeeds and announces a cabinet shortly, it is thought that his government would be short lived. Financiers are suspicious of Herriot's policies, believing that under his administration France would suffer further declines. Dissolution of the Chamber and new elections are looked upon as serious steps at this time, especially when it is realized that a form of dictatorship might be necessary to revive the exchange during the elections.

CAMPBELLTON TO SEND DETACHMENTS

Party of 9 Officers and 35 N.C.O.'s to Train at Sussex

CAMPBELLTON, June 18.—At least 9 officers and 35 N. C. O.'s and men from this district will go to camp Sussex, which opens next Friday. It was announced by Major W. M. Ferguson here yesterday. The quota from Campbellton is made up as follows: New Brunswick Dragoons under Major W. M. Ferguson, who received notification of his majority this morning, and Lieutenants James H. Moore, William Miller, Horace Jardine and 10 troopers; a unit of 10 signallers attached to headquarters of the N. B. Dragoons under Lieut. Colin McKenzie and 18 Infantry N. C. O.'s under Capt. Frederick Watson, with Lieutenants Daniel J. Dewar, Edgar Shannon, Lloyd Jamieson and William Sullivan. All units have begun training and new recruits are showing up in fine style. Sgt. Major Doyle from headquarters M. D. No. 7, Saint John, has been in Campbellton for the past two weeks, and the New Brunswick Dragoons have already been out with their horses on the race track here. The signaller section of the N. B. Dragoons under Lieut. C. MacKenzie, have just completed a 6 weeks' course of instruction through headquarters at Saint John, and examinations were held here on Wednesday and Thursday under the direction of Lieut-Colonel L. E. Powers, D.S.O. Upon their return from camp the local signalling unit will enter the Dominion efficiency cup competition. Two years ago the Campbellton section won the distinction of leading the cavalry branch and coming fifth among competitors throughout Canada.

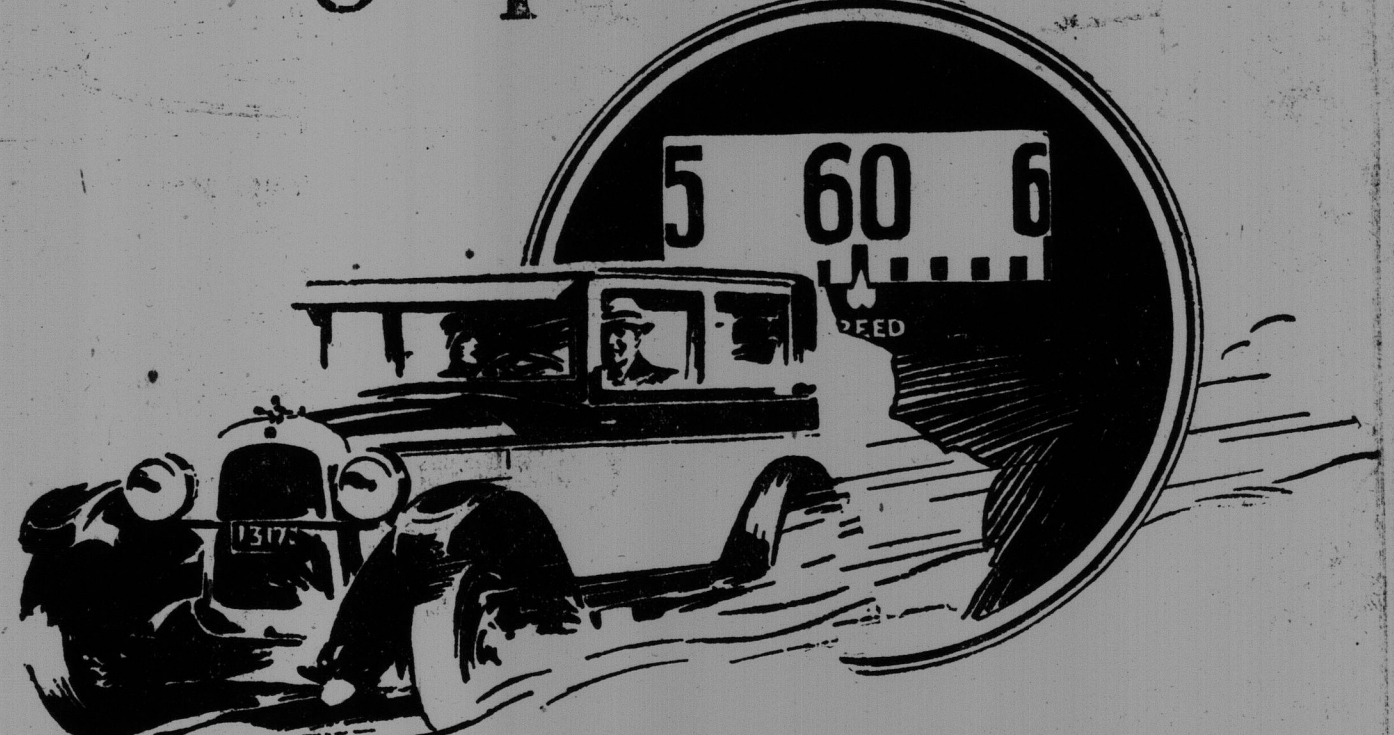

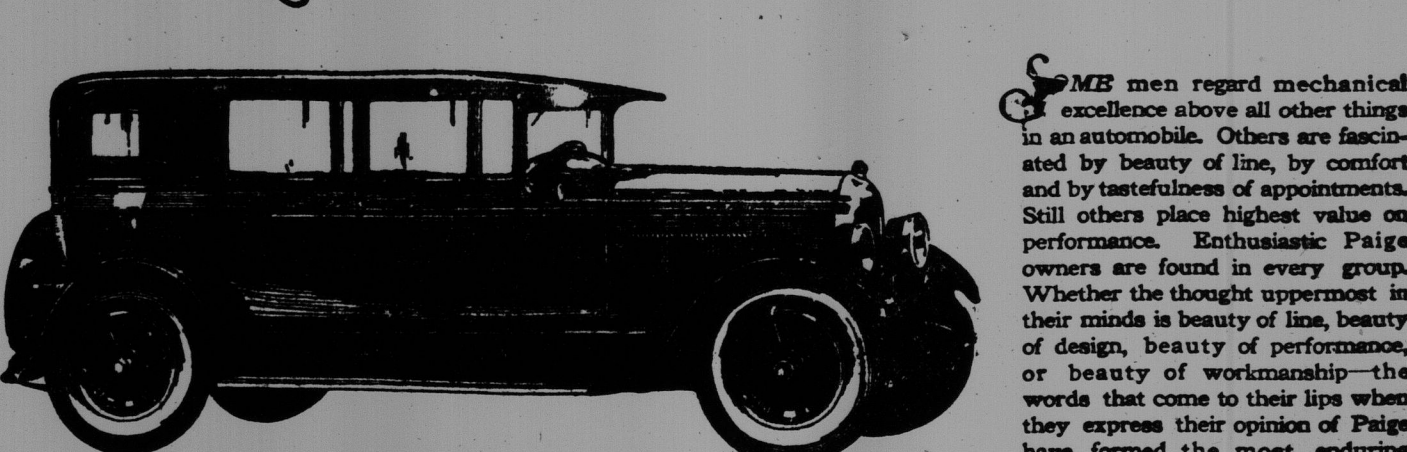
