

UTILITIES BOARD  
DEFERS DECISION

Applications Re Sale of Securities—A Fredericton Complaint.

The New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities met this morning in the Government rooms. Prince William McDonald is president and William McDonald secretary. The secretary appeared before the board, in company with his solicitor, Mr. J. A. McLeod, and provided some information for which the board has asked at the last meeting. The board took the application under consideration but deferred judgment.

INSURANCE ON LUMBER FOR COURT DECISION

A statement relative to the reports of three surveys, James Keenan, W. Smith and LeB. Finlay, of lumber being sold to the Buckley Estate on the North Shore was a feature of evidence given by Lee Buckley, executor of the estate, at a hearing before Judge Chandler here today. It is the case of the Buckley Estate vs the Liverpool London and Globe Fire Insurance Companies. Begun in Newcastle, it was then heard in Moncton, and will be completed here. The sum of \$100,000 is involved. H. A. Powell, K. C., appeared for the Royal Bank of Canada, M. G. Teed, K. C., and E. A. Reilly, K. C., for the Buckley Estate and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., and J. H. A. L. Patweather, K. C., for the insurance companies. Details have been reported before.

The direct examination of Lee Buckley, has been conducted in Moncton, and he was called in cross examination this morning by Dr. Taylor. Mr. Buckley said he had never seen the survey made by Smith and Keenan and denied that Keenan had given him a copy of the totals and that looking them he had asked for another copy which had been made out for him. He held the difference between the Smith and Keenan survey and that of Dolan and Donohy had been something like two and a half million feet.

San Francisco, July 25.—Approximately 200 longshoremen went on strike here yesterday as a protest against the failure of shipping interests to increase their wages from 10 cents to 11 an hour. The loading of three vessels was delayed but the work later was continued.

Winnipeg Rum Sale Within Two Months

Winnipeg, July 25.—Government stores in Winnipeg and at other points in the province will be selling liquor for beverage purposes on the lines laid down in the Moderation League legislation in about two months. It was stated in Parliament circles last night. The opinion was expressed that it would be impossible for the commission which will conduct the provincial liquor business, and which has still to be appointed, to make all the necessary arrangements inside two months, while the feeling was general that, if no time were lost, the preliminary work should be completed in that time.

Lloyd George Plans Trip To Canada Next October

Quebec, July 25.—Through a committee formed in Toronto arrangements are being made for a visit to Canada of the Right Hon. David Lloyd George, ex-premier of England.  
Information to that effect was contained in a letter which was received here yesterday by Mayor Sanson from J. O. McCarthy, chairman of the Lloyd George Committee.  
The present plans are that Mr. Lloyd George would sail from Liverpool on the C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain on October 3 and would land at Quebec either on the evening of October 10th or the morning of October 11th.  
The ex-premier is proposing a brief tour through Canada and two or three days in the U.S. The committee have urged upon him that he should land in Canada and leave from Canada. It is pointed out that while he will speak at a brotherhood congress in Toronto, his trip will be of a national character rather than under any particular auspices.

12 ARE FINED FOR ILLEGAL FISHING

Fredericton, July 25.—The matter of protecting forest lands during the blue-berrying season is under consideration. It is possible that wardens will be assigned to this special duty.  
In twelve cases at Perth yesterday in which illegal fishing through the ice last winter was charged, fines of \$18 each were imposed.  
At Grand Falls today preliminary hearing was given in the case of three men charged with acting illegally.  
DULL IN HARBOR  
One steamer, a four-master and a three-master, all loading lumber in a slip, at West St. John.  
A three-master discharging coal at Long wharf, and a tiny schooner discharging sugar on snows.  
A two-master at McLeod's wharf, having discharged a cargo of tar and pitch, and said to be awaiting charter.  
Five small schooners in Market Slip, one of them discharging dry fish and another laid up.  
For the rest, the harbor is an open expanse at present. The shipping trade is dull, and a waterfront man this morning recalled with a reminiscent sigh the summers of thirty years ago or perhaps later, when a dozen transporters could be seen in the stream loading deals, besides other steamers and large sailing craft at the wharves. Mr. B. would be almost filled with Bay schooners, whose place has been taken by the small steamer and auxiliary craft. The old order changed.

Carnegie and Bride Start On Honeymoon

Chicago, July 25.—David Carnegie, eleventh Earl of Northesk, and his bride, formerly Jessica Brown, chorus beauty, slipped out of Chicago yesterday as quietly as they slipped in just a week ago. They started by motor to the Thousand Islands where they expected to pass several weeks before going to England.  
Chicago is a perfectly lovely place to have been married in, remarked the Countess of Northesk, as she stepped into the automobile. "But it is a terrible place to be getting married in," supplemented the Earl, recalling the blizzards of publicity that accompanied their marriage last Thursday.

Columbia Rammed in Collision Off Sable Id.

Gloucester, Mass., July 25.—The fishing schooner Columbia has been towed into St. Pierre, Miquelon, by the French steamer L'Annamite, which rammed the schooner off Sable Island, according to word received here by the owners from the vessel's captain. The Columbia was on her second fishing trip out of her port since she was built last fall as a possibility of competing in the annual international fishermen's race.  
According to the message received here, the vessel's bowsprit was broken and her rigging carried away. Fear was expressed here that her injuries might such that she would not be in condition to race in the trials prior to the international contest off Halifax in October.

Paint Instead Of a New Depot

Hopes of a start being made this year on the erection of a new station were a glimmering this morning when some painters from the C. N. R. shops in Moncton started to repaint the interior of the Union Depot. Staging was set up in the ladies' waiting room and the men went to work removing a thick coating of smoke and soot from the walls preparatory to putting on a new coat of paint. People who watched the operations, were heard to remark "Well the old place looks good for another year." 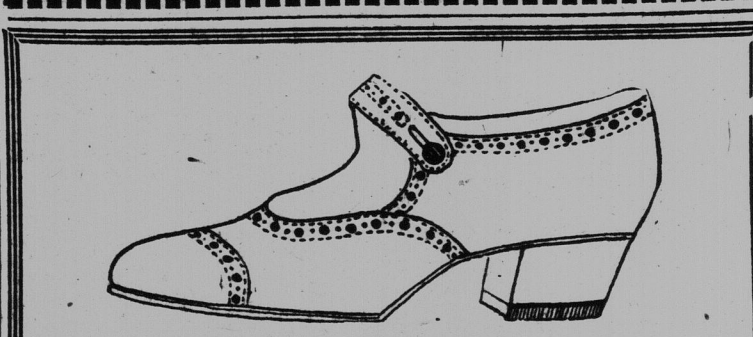

A church building not quite completed, a school which had been built only about three or four years, a large residence and a well-stocked store were among the buildings lost yesterday afternoon as the result of a fire which broke out in a woodshed at the rear of the property of S. A. Stafford in Lepreau. For a time it was feared that the flames would spread to the rest of the village and to the woods between Lepreau and Musquash, but the efforts of an energetic band of fire fighters kept them down.  
No estimate of the total damage could be secured, but it was learned that the school building was new, that the residence of Mr. Stafford was a large and valuable one, and that his store was well stocked. It was said that he had no insurance on the property. It was reported that the blaze commenced at the rear of Mr. Stafford's home from some unknown cause.
