HIS HOLLOW ARM IS EMPTY.

Alleged Drug Vendor Goes to Sing Sing for 1 to 7 Years.

When Salvatore Santori of 2,029 Second Avenue, started for Sing Sing to begin a one-to-seven year sentence for carrying a revolver, his hollow arm was empty of drugs for the first time in quite a spell. This, on the authority of Detective Gruenger and Schmucker of the Narcotic Division, whose testimony caused Judge Mulqueen to impose sentence in New York.

According to the detectives who had been trying for months to prove Santori a narcotic vendor. Every time they "frisked" him, however, they failed to get the evidence. On Jan. 30, they told the judge they decided to make their investigations more thorough. They found Santori had a hollow, artificial arm and in it, they said, were found twenty bottles of heroin. Between the elbow and shoulder was another hollow spot, and there, they said, Santori kept the supplies for the "small trade" in little packets of the drug.

Never Bought Any.
