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They would be nearly as much of the Odd city visible today as there was in the time of the Incas, had not the stones been so attractive to the Indians of nearby villages. As it is, beautifully carved idols have gone to decorate the tone of Frederick I. Sherwood, who was drowned July 27, 1910.
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After several centuries of this plunder the government of Bolivia put a ban on removing stones from the ruins, but there was then little left of old Tiahuanaco. A few stone gods as huge and angular as any dieties of Egypt, the sites of a fortress, a palace, and many tombs, all vaguely marked by worn carved stones are scattered over a great desolate plain. Yet from these battered relies with their cryptic carvings the archaeologists hope some day to reconstruct the story of a mysterious people.
