Capt. John McNeil of the Y. M. C. A. overseas, formerly pastor of the Walnut Road Baptist church, Toronto, relates that in going among the American camps in France the mere mention of the fact that he was a Canadian opened to him every door.

A former Canadian writing from a village in the hills of New Mexico tells of the visit of Lieut. Crozier of Winnipeg, and the enthusiasm thereof of the little town, \$25,000 being subscribed for war purposes as a tangible result.

Every Canadian who visits the northern states these days is aware of the attention and respect which is paid to Canadians. Not that we have not always stood well in the republic. Canadians have long had a good name in America.

But today the citizen of this country is regarded as never before, not only in the United States but throughout the world. The heroism of our soldiers and the resolute patriotism of our people have given us a place that all time will not efface.

Better yet, the standard we have set for ourselves in relation to the war is showing its effect upon ourselves. We Canadians think more highly of Canadians than hitherto. We recognize that we are citizens of no mean country. We have larger confidence in ourselves and in our future.
