BE REBUILT

Financial Committee Appointed to Secure Funds to Provide Adequate and Modern Facilities

The congregation of St. David's Presbyterian church is proceeding with the plans for the restoration of their church building, which was destroyed by fire recently. A finance committee has been selected to look after the work of raising the necessary additional funds and the committee has organized with John Willet, K. C., as chairman ;D. W. Ledingham, vice-chairman, and James Mac-

Murray secretary. In rebuilding, the church auditorium will be located on the ground floor and the Sunday school and other departments will be housed in an extension which will be erected in the rear, reached from the street by a covered passage

way.

The effort to carry on the work of the church in unsuitable quarters has been found unsatisfactory and building experts have expressed the opinion that the cost of reconstruction will be as low this year as can be expected for years

FOLLY TO DISTURB STATUS OF C. P. R.

New York, Jan. 26-The Wall Street

Journal, in today's edition, publishes a leading editorial on what is described as a "flare-up in western Canada over the agitation for government ownership of all the railways, including the Canadian Presses." of all the railways, including the Canadian Pacific."

"Not all of the co-operative socialists, advocates of state socialism and proponents of what is called communality, from all the farmers, mercantile and lumber associations combined, could transfer the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the convergent event ware the convergent area. to the government, even were the government itself willing," the editorial insists. 
