### More Than Seventy Per Cent. of **Qualified Voters Cast Their Ballots**

In the primary election in 1922 of the 9,708 who were qualified to vote there were cast 6,383 ballots. This year of the 9,790 qualified voters, 6,931 went to the polls and voted. The percentage of eligible electors that polled their votes this year was 70.79 and in the 1912 primaries 65.749. The totals were:


