HON. MR. KING  
BOOSTS INTERESTS  
OF PORT OF ST. JOHN

Tells Parliament at Ottawa About Need of Facilities Here to Handle Canada's Trade.

Ottawa, June 1—Of paramount interest to the people of St. John amid the varied events of today's budget debate was the speech in which Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition, drew the attention of parliament to the inadequacy of the facilities of the port to take care of the shipping drawn to the port to carry away Canada's products to all parts of the earth. He referred to his own visit to the port of St. John and outlined the situation which was drawn to his attention by the Commercial Club in a tour of the port. His visit was made in January, and he was so impressed with the situation that he had a list made of the ships that filled every wharf there as well as the thirteen or fourteen ocean liners which had to "wait their turn to get a place to anchor in the harbor." He referred as well to photographs sent him giving an exhibition of railroad terminals so jammed with cars that it is impossible to find a bit of open track on any part of them.

RECONCILIATION"

Rome, June 2—The papal encyclical on "Christian reconciliation," reclaiming the veto on official visits of Catholic sovereigns to the king in Rome. Benedict XV says that "it seems to be called for by the gravity of the moment and the established custom of exchanging visits for consultation between the heads of states and governments," but that, so far, from relinquishing his protest against the actual abnormal position of the Holy See and its supreme representative, the Pope expects a reconstituted society to facilitate a solution compatible with the dignity of the church.
