MANY LIBERALS ARE  
LEAVING THE PARTY  
IN NORTHUMBERLANDMr. Morrison Actively Assisted  
by Honest Liberals who  
Place Country's Welfare Ahead  
of Party Ties.

Newcastle, Aug. 30.—In every sec-

tion of this county former staunch

liberals are renouncing their allegi-

ance to that party and are coming

out openly in opposition to the re-

ciprocitiy deal. Not only this but a

large number of prominent men are

actively taking the field and are par-

ticipating in Mr. Morrison's cam-

paign. The deserters from the Lib-

eral group can be numbered by hun-

dreds and the present outlook is that

the proposed deal with the United

States will be buried out of sight on

polling day.

The meetings which are being held

by Mr. Morrison and his friends are

attended on all sides as the largest

and most enthusiastic have ever tak-

en place in this county. In the

parishes of Ludlow and Blissett

the meetings have taken place yester-

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
