The Biue Book, just issued for the lit has been in the past, and the only month of October, 1917, shows that St. John is easily the second port in Canada and point of imports and exports, having a lead of \$23,000,000 over Fort William, which is in third place. Its nearest, Maritime Province rival is Halifax, and St. John city has a lead of over \$54,000,000 over that port. 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### IUNICIPAL COUNCIL PASSED ESTIMATES FOR ENSUING YEAR

Net Increase of \$35,386.61 Over 1917-Big Increase Due to Appropriation for General Public Hospital-County Hospital, Municipal Home and Board of Health Required More Money.

The finance committee of the Municipal Council met yesterday afternoon
and passed the estimates for 1918.

There is a net increase of \$35,386.61
St.
St. over the year 1917, due to a decrease
in the amount for jail and court house
and jail guards of \$6,000. Had this
amount been the same as last year the
increase would have been over \$40,
007.

The big increase in the appropriation is for the General Public Hospital, that item being over \$22,000
larger than last year; the St. John
County Hospital asks for over \$4,000
more and the Municipal Home Tornearly \$9,000 more, while the Board of
Health requires over \$1,000 more than
they had last year. Delegations from
cach of these bodies were present at

asked for should be granted and convinced the committee that their appost was justified.
