Canadiens by three goals to one be-  
fore a fair sized house, the majority  
of which were supporters of the los-  
ing club in view of the fact that  
Malone, Hall and McDonald, Quebec  
players figure with the Frenchmen.  
Ottawa won by superior team play  
aided by superb goal tending by  
Clint Benedict, who earned hearty  
applause from the crowd in the third  
period by his sensational work. It  
was a clean game, not a penalty being  
inflicted, though Hall might have  
been handed one for a savage check  
which he handed out to Nighbor early  
in the game. Malone was watched  
too closely to be effective, the Ottawa  
defence being unbreakable. Canadiens
