NO MORE CASES.

Less than a dozen of St. John business men went to Moncton to attend the meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade. Most of those who would have liked to have gone were too busy.

WINDOW BROKEN.
Edward McJure's barber shop window, Mill street, was broken yesterday morning when a large woman slipped on a banana peel and struck a busy barber pole with force sufficient to wrench it from its fastenings and cause it to crash through a large pane of plate glass. The shop had not been opened for the day, so no one was hurt. The woman, outside of a severe shaking, escaped unharmed.

P. E. I. RAILWAY.
The first standard gauge train on the P. E. I. Railway was run on Sunday over that part of the road laid out with a third rail, viz. from Jordan to Summerside and Charlottetown and return to Jordan. A locomotive and eight passenger coaches made the test trip in good time and without incident. The third rail section will be ready for general standard gauge passenger and freight traffic about October 1st, but standard passenger cars will run during exhibition week. Several engineers and local officials made the trip.

SERVANTS WANTED.
Mayor Hayes has received a letter from the Lynn, Mass., Employment Bureau asking if there were any "respectable papers" in St. John and the vicinity in which advertisements might be inserted for domestic help. The Employment Bureau in Lynn says it has been impossible to get servants since the war started, and seems to think that New Brunswick is full of domestic servants. His Worship intimated that he was somewhat worried as to whether he should certify that the St. John papers were respectable seeing that they were not always respectful of the city council.

COMMITTEES MEET.
The Standing Mission Committee of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference met yesterday morning in Centenary Church parlor, with the president, Rev. H. E. Thomas, Sackville, presiding. Routine business was taken, which consisted mainly in the reviewing of the missions of the Conference and making of appropriations for the year. Those present were: Rev. HARBOR QUESTION.
Mr. Wigmore, M. P., had a conference with the city authorities before he left for Ottawa, at which he stated that General Newburn would probably take up with the government the matter of reserving to the city the right of operating a ferry after the government had taken over the harbor. Mayor Hayes said yesterday that as soon as the government adopted provisions in the proposed agreement of transfer, protecting the city's right in the ferry service, and established rates and bounds for the harbor, the city solicitor would be asked to prepare a form of plebiscite to be submitted to the citizens.

CAPT. STURDEE HOME.
Captain E. D. Sturdee, who went overseas with the First Contingent, reached St. John on Tuesday. He left here with the first company of the 2nd Regiment and at Valcartier joined the 12th Battalion, First Contingent. The first time he went to France was with the 15th Battalion, 48th Highlanders, and on the second occasion with the 6th Regiment. Following the Vimy Ridge fight, Capt. Sturdee was invalided to London. He was afterwards sent to Buxton, Derbyshire, as hospital representative, where he served from March, 1918, to August, 1919. Capt. Sturdee appears to be in excellent health and reports a pleasant voyage homeward bound.

POLICE COURT.
In the police court yesterday Roy Morrison was charged by the captain of the S.S. Governor Dingley with breaking cargo and stealing some chocolates and cigars. The case was postponed for more evidence.

Valley Railway
Coming Here
In A Few Days

Report of Agreement With
C. P. R.—Premier Foster
Expects to Make An An-
nouncement at End of
Week.

There was a story on the street yesterday to the effect that a temporary agreement had been made between the Valley Railway and the C. P. R. in regard to running rights from Westfield to St. John, and that the Canadian National Railways would open a service on the Valley Road next week. Premier Foster when asked about the story said nothing definite had been arrived at yet, but added that he expected to be able to make an announcement in regard to the negotiations at the end of the week.

H. C. Groat, superintendent of the Atlantic Division of the C. P. R., said he had not received word of any agreement between the C. P. R. and the Valley Railway, but intimated that he would not be surprised if the matter was settled any day. He thought, however, Premier Foster would have definite word before anybody.

According to the report on the street yesterday the Canadian National will be starting trains over the Valley Railway next week, and it is understood the proposed time table provides for an express train between St. John and Moncton every other day. Sleeping cars will be attached to the express trains, which indicates that the Canadian National attaches some importance to the proposed service, as on the trains run between Moncton and Lewis by the National Transcontinental route there have been no sleeping cars.

Some Cases of
Scarlet Fever In
St. John Now
But Health Official Says
There is No Need for Any-
body to Worry—Mild Form
—Unnecessary Alarm Over
Typhoid Cases.

There are some cases of scarlet fever in the city, but the officials of the Board of Health say there is no cause for anybody to worry. The number who are down with this disease was said to be no greater than usual, and the health officials said there had often been times when there were a great many more cases of scarlet fever in the city, and no notice was taken of them. The health officials wanted it distinctly understood that there is no epidemic of scarlet fever in the city. There are only a few cases; there are also some cases of scarlet fever in other parts of the province. It is of a mild type.

Officials of the Board of Health think some of the newspapers unduly scared the citizens by their reports on the typhoid cases in the city. There has not been a single death from typhoid in the city this summer, though typhoid has appeared in a mild form. Altogether since July there have been typhoid cases in twenty houses in the city, mostly in the Erin street district. At some of the houses more than one person has been taken with the disease. In some cases the disease has been traced to sewers, and remedies have been ordered. W. H. Ernest, typhoid expert, has attributed to the milk supply, and a number of farmers in whose milk supply there have been found a dangerous bacilli have been prohibited from sending milk to the city. This has given rise to considerable uneasiness in Kings county, from whence a goodly proportion of the milk supply has been derived, but the health officials say these fears are unfounded. There has been nothing like an epidemic of typhoid. Cases occur once in a while. The milk supply is under close supervision, and any bacilli in milk is noted at once, and the milk from a whole herd is stopped from coming to the city till the health officials are satisfied.
