Council Business Delayed If Petitioners Attend Its Regular Sittings.

TO COMMITTEES FIRST

Fairer Hearing Accorded to Desires of Citizens by This Method.

The city council is standing firmly by its rule of procedure which requires deputations to come before the committee directly interested in their problem instead of addressing the council as a instead of addressing the council as a whole. Deputations on various subjects were refused a hearing last night and informed that they would have to lay their cases before the proper commit-

tees next week.

The rule was adopted several years ago after it was found that large deputations were seriously interfering with council business. Usually committee re-ports, bylaws and other matters give the ports, bytaws and other matters give the aldermen plenty to do without bringing in other matters. When extraneous mat-ters are introduced it often means that more important matters are slighted. It is also argued that the deputations

It is also argued that the deputations receive a fairer hearing before the committees. The atmosphere is less formal, and the members of the deputation and the committee can discuss the matter in detail. The recommendation of the committee is passed on at the next meeting, so that all the aldermen have an opportunity to express an opinion on it if tunity to express an opinion on it they so desire.
