

The same method of calculation obtains whether for farmers of others. This part refers to both Form T1 and Form T1a. For incomes above \$5,000 three taxes apply:

First—The normal tax. For the part of the income below \$6,000 the same rate of 4 per cent as is levied on small incomes is used. For the part of the income over \$6,000 the rate is 8 per cent.
