FORT WILLIAM HAS SOME O.B.U. FRIENDS

THREE UNIONS SAID TO HAVE GONE OVER.
(Special To The Record.)
Fort William, Oct. 10.—Three unions at Fort William have joined the O. B. U. and a central labor council has been formed there, according to R. B. Russell. These unions are the bakers' organization, general laborers and employees of the starch works. The carpenters and coal handlers. said Russell, are also taking a vote on the question.

Russell further stated that the members of District 18, Southern Alberta, have commenced paying their per-capita tax to the O. B. U. These men, he says, were forced into the international after their strike in order to get their jobs back. Now he said they are returning to the O. B. U. Others who have joined recently, according to same information are the railway carmen in Saskatchewan and C. P. R. employees at Brandon. Arrangements are being made to send organizers here, again, to Dauphin, Humboldt and other small towns in the west. These places, it was said, have been asking for more information.

Sir William Hearst, who arrived here yesterday afternoon, declined to discuss the new prohibition bill before the Dominion house, again, his knowledge of what the bills really are, said he, when seen by a reporter, and I cannot say anything about them.

The Premier also had not heard of any threatened bill among the Conservatives at Ottawa.

The reporter pointed out that a caucus had been called to discuss the Doherty bill and that it was said in some quarters the pushing of this legislation might prejudice the present campaign in Ontario, but Sir William was not to be drawn and said he could not at present make any statement on the matter.

U. S. CAPITALISTS TAKE OBJECTIONS

Washington, Oct. 10.—Opposition to collective bargaining and the closed shop were among the twelve fundamental principles outlined by a group representing Capital and industry to-day at the National Industrial Conference here. Sympathetic strikes, blacklists and boycotts were declared to be "Indefensible," and "social and immoral."

80 MILES SHORT OF MINOOLA.

FOUR FRENCH HURT SARREBUCK RIOT

DUE TO HIGH COST OF LIVING.

Paris, Oct. 10.—A French major and three soldiers were wounded in a riot at Sarrebruck in occupied Germany. The riot is described as having grown out of labor demonstrations against the high cost of living, in which the Spartacists joined.

CHICAGO TURN DESPAIR INTO HOPE FOR VICTORY.

Took Seventh Game By 4 to 1. Sallee Hit Hard By Them. Cicotte In Strong Form.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 8.—Winning today's game against Cincinnati, 4 to 1, the recently dejected and all but hopeless White Sox, of Chicago, now consider themselves real contenders for the world's baseball championship. The series now stands four games for Cincinnati and three for the American League leaders. To-morrow, weather permitting, they play in Chicago. The athletes of the pallid Sox took the train to-night, jubilant at the manner in which they have snatched a chance of victory from what seemed certain defeat, and were determined that the eighth contest, played on their own familiar real estate, will be cheered by their loyal following, will see the series tied up.
