London, Jan. 18.-The work of he Italian authorities in preserving Italy's art treasures against bombardment, was described by Major Sir F. de Filippi, in a lecture before the Royal Academy here recently.
"Italy has been fully alive to her esponsibility for the art of which she is the guardian," said the lecturer, "and has spared nothing in her endeavor to protect her cities and their treasures. In Venetian, Lombardian and Tuscan towns I saw door monuments are often completely enclosed in what look like big dog kennels. In many cases new masonry has been put in to strengthen historic structures, an delaborate systems of drainage have been installed to further enforce the natural strength of the buildings.

"Bags of seaweed, very light and elastic, have been extensively and successfully used in Venice for St. Mark's and other buildings. Bronzes, pictures and small monuments have been removed in colossal packing cases and taken to places of security. 
