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

This year the Nova Scotia government switched its policy on bursaries, after students had planned their finances for the academic year.

Not only do the changes mean you probably won't qualify for as much bursary as you had banked on, if you receive any at all, it probably won't arrive until after the end of the academic year. The changes mean extra paperwork and that means a backlog of over 1600 unprocessed bursary forms

Fair? No, but what can we expect from an Education Minister whose respect for students is evident in his vocabulary. We are "the youngsters" or "the young ones" in the mind of Terry Donahoe, a mind that fails to take into account the maturity of sixth year medical students or even twenty year old undergraduates.


